Christmas Confusion

It is said that a Japanese department store once had as its Christmas window display Santa nailed to a cross. This seems to be an urban legend – I can't find direct evidence of this happening. Nevertheless, it's become a popular story, typifying Japanese misunderstanding of Western culture. Of course, we Westerners misunderstand Japanese culture. Worse than that, Westerners, too, can confuse God and Santa.

There are two confusions between God and Santa that we easily fall into here in the West. One is to treat them both as equally fictitious. Father Christmas is a nice story we tell for the sake of the children, to help them feel the magic of Christmas, and to get them to behave a little bit better during December. Some people think that God and the story of the birth of Jesus fall into the same category – no more than a nice story to make the children feel good, and give them an incentive to behave better. But the biblical accounts of Jesus' birth are messy and real. In Jesus, the true God has visited the earth in person. He came to earth, not to give us a warm feeling of general goodwill, but to give us the unimaginable joys of knowing the creator of the universe. He doesn't just want us to behave a little bit better than normal; he wants our whole lives. Christmas is for grown-ups, not just for children.

Another potential pitfall is to confuse the character and personality of Santa Claus with that of God. Santa in popular culture is a powerful supernatural being, typically depicted as a big, bearded fellow. He's depicted positively: genial, smiling, laughing; yet he's distant, living a long way away. Moreover, he's master of a surveillance society that totalitarian states can only dream of: he seeks when you are sleeping, he knows when you're awake, he knows when you've been bad or good, so be good, for goodness' sake. You need to make sure you're on his nice list, not his naughty list, because this supernaturally powerful bearded man promises reward for those whose good deeds outweigh their bad, but if not, you'd better watch out...

This depiction of Santa has much in common with how God is often depicted in Western culture, but the two are not the same. We know God the Father does not have a physical body, let alone a beard, yet artists through the ages, if they are to depict Him at all, have had to choose some way of portraying Him. More seriously, God does not give gifts on the same basis as Santa is supposed to. God promises blessing, not for those who think they're nice, but for those who admit they're naughty. As Jesus said: 'It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but those who are ill. I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners.' (Mark 2:17) The Pharisees thought they were on God's nice list, and rejected Jesus because of their pride. It is the tax collectors and others who admit they're naughty who receive blessing from and relationship with God. For Jesus doesn't just drop presents down the chimney and then fly away. Jesus Himself is the greatest present of all. Jesus gives us many gifts, but the greatest gift of all is knowing the Giver, and being known by Him.


Thanks also go to those who distribute the newsletter for us, you see the newsletter doesn't just appear a lot of hard work does go into it, even the unintended mistakes




Bible Bite

So the shepherds decided to go down into Bethlehem to see what they had been told about...




.. and they found Mary, Joseph, and the baby in the manger just as they had been told.

For to Us a Child is Born

'For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.' (Isaiah 9:6)

Approaching Christmas, we are very aware of the political and economic uncertainties that face us. The prophet Isaiah also lived in such uncertain times, as the Assyrians had just conquered the northern kingdom of Israel (734-732 BC). This fulfilled Isaiah's warnings to the people, who had turned their back on God and His ways. However, Isaiah is able to bring a word of hope, promising a Messiah who would come like a great light: *'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light'* (Isaiah 9:2). These words are fulfilled in the birth of Jesus 700 years later and describe person of Jesus:

Wonderful Counsellor: He will give us the wisdom we need, especially when we have difficult decisions to make at work or home, or in dealing with our finances or future direction.

Mighty God: He will provide the help and strength to face a difficult diagnosis, family crisis or relationships breakdown, as we trust His plan and purpose for our lives.

Everlasting Father: He cares for us as a father cares for His children, so that we can come to Him when we feel alone or we are really struggling, knowing that He hears and will answer our prayers.

Prince of Peace: He has secured peace by His cross and resurrection, and so we can find in Him true acceptance, forgiveness and peace for our lives, relationships and future.

Christmas is the time to celebrate a God who is faithful to all His promises, *'the zeal of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this'* (7)

Christmas - the most beautiful story ever told

On the BBC's 'Today' programme last Christmas a distinguished atheist revealed that his Christmas routine included attending Midnight Mass. Asked why, he replied that it was the most beautiful story ever told and he didn't want it to be forgotten.

Up and down the country this month, thousands and thousands of parents will be attending school and church nativity plays. They're good fun, the children like them, and they remind us of the most lovely and memorable story of all time.

First, there was the actual birth. Excluded from the shelter of the 'inn', Mary and Joseph found themselves in a stable. Soon after, Mary gave birth to a boy, wrapped Him in His birth-robe, and laid Him in the only secure place she could find – the feeding trough.

Next came the shepherds, bursting in from the fields, eager to see the baby that the angels had told them to look for, 'lying in a manger'. They worshipped him, in wonder of all that had happened that night.

Finally, at some point came the so called 'Wise Men'. The gospel calls them 'Magi', and says they were from the East. The word 'magi' comes from the Greek 'magos' (magic) and further back, from the old Persian word 'Magupati'. The Magi could have been priests from an ancient Persian religion that watched the night sky. Today they would be called astrologers.

Whoever they were, their influence at that point in history was immense. All over the ancient world their predictions were regarded with awe, but they knelt before Jesus and offered Him gifts. They were the first Gentiles to recognise a divine and kingly power and purpose in the baby in Bethlehem.

150 years later the great bishop Clement of Rome described this as the moment when the old order of fear and fate gave way before this new era of love and grace.

St Johns Church

As you may be aware, the Church of St John the Divine has a significant problem with water raining in from the roof parapet. St John's Parochial Church Council sought the advice of a high level roof repair company as recommended by the Diocese to inspect the roof area, who recommend that temporary repairs are done in the short term to make the church watertight. which means covering the roof with tarpaulin as soon as possible. Next spring hopefully, frost free weather conditions will enable essential repairs and pointing of the stonework on the higher levels of the church to be undertaken. An appeal will be made in the New Year in order to raise the necessary funds for the work to be carried out.

St John's Parochial Church Council will continue to seek grant funding to repair the Bell Tower which is also in need of repair. The church was dedicated in 1912 and no major repair work has been carried out over the past 107 year but with the support of our parishioners and the community of Coppull will remain at the centre of village events.
