Liturgical year







Sunday will be the first Sunday of Advent.

The Church's liturgical year begins with Advent and this Sunday is the beginning of Advent. In a few weeks it will be Christmas so it is time to begin getting ready! During Advent, we remember the birth of Jesus and so we need to get ourselves and our homes prepared to celebrate His birthday. In church and in school we have an Advent wreath with three purple candles, a pink candle and a white candle. The circle of wreath, which has no beginning or end, is made of evergreens and signifies the everlasting life we find in Christ. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent and one candle is lit each Sunday with the fifth candle, the white one, being lit on Christmas day. The candles also have their own special significance Lighting the candles on the Advent wreath helps us to remember that Jesus, the light of the world, is coming. We start with one candle, and every Sunday light one more, so that the closer we get to Jesus' coming the brighter the light gets. -the four weeks prior to Christmas.

Week 1- Hope

Week 2- Peace

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Week 3- Joy (the pink candle)

Week 4- Love

Christmas Day- Jesus (white candle)



Sunday 30th November 1st Sunday of Advent



At Mass for the first weekend of Advent, the first purple candle on the Advent Wreath is lit. This candle signifies HOPE and this candle is sometimes referred to as the Prophecy Candle. During the first week we light the Prophet's Candle as we focus on the virtue of hope. This week is a time to acknowledge that Jesus is coming. We should begin preparing our hearts to welcome Him at Christmas.

Let us pray that this season of Advent may fill us all with hope, peace, joy and love as we prepare for the birth of Jesus the light of the world. Amen





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Mission- our faith in action Each week we send the children out with a 'mission' to actively live out their faith in their everyday lives.



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As we enter December and the liturgical season of Advent, we reflect on how we can share love with our neighbour. Please use this calendar throughout the coming weeks as a family.








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Our final 'Virtues to Live By' for the Autumn term is Patience.

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

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Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs

In Britain we accept that other people might have different beliefs than ours and they may believe in different religions.







As part of **Other Faiths Week**, the school welcomed a special visitor named **Seema**, who led an engaging assembly on **Hinduism**. She introduced the children to key aspects of the Hindu religion, helping them understand important beliefs, traditions, and places of worship.

The pupils especially enjoyed the opportunity to try on traditional clothing worn by Hindus when visiting a Mandir (temple) to pray. This hands-on experience helped bring the learning to life and gave the children a deeper appreciation of Hindu culture and practices.

Seema also spoke about the origins of Hinduism, the significance of the **Om** symbol, Hindu holy books, and typical foods—highlighting that many Hindus follow a **vegetarian diet**. She went on to explain the different ways the god **Brahma** is represented. To finish, each key stage took part in a **question-and-answer session**, helping pupils deepen their understanding of the Hindu faith.

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Christmas Dinner will be served on Thursday 18^{th} December and it will be available to **ALL** children if they wish to take it.

Reception class, Year 1 and Year 2 children are entitled to a free meal under the **UNIVERSAL FREE MEAL SCHEME** and lunches will be ordered for all children who want one. No money will be needed for these children. Just let the class teacher know if your child has a packed lunch but would like Christmas dinner instead that day.

Year 3 to Year 6 children who are already on dinners **and pay for their meals** do not need to do anything as they will order their dinner as usual.

Year 3 to Year 6 children **who are entitled to a free school meal** but bring packed lunch will need to inform the class teacher if they would like a Christmas dinner so correct numbers can be ordered.

Year 3 to Year 6 children **who are not entitled to a free school meal** and usually have a pack up but would like a Christmas dinner need to bring £3.00 in a clearly labelled envelope with name, class, reason and amount and pass it to the class teacher.





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What has been happening in school this week.

This week, **Year 1** have continued to learn about healthy eating. They thoroughly enjoyed making a fruit salad within their groups and looked forward to tasting the finished product. The children practised using the bridge and claw cutting methods as they prepared their fruit. One pupil was heard saying, "This is so tasty. The fruit is delicious." Great teamwork Year 1!







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Last week, children in **Year 3** enjoyed a visit from author and illustrator **Chris Mould**. The children were highly engaged and inspired as Chris shared examples of his artwork and read extracts from some of his stories. They also took part in a draw-along session, learning how to illustrate in his unique style. To finish, the children asked thoughtful questions about how Chris began his journey into writing and illustrating.












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As part of their work on electricity in Science, **Year 5** pupils were challenged to construct and modify series circuits. They experimented with adding and removing different components—such as bulbs, switches, motors, and additional batteries—to observe how these changes affected the strength of the current and the voltage in the circuit. Through hands-on investigation, pupils developed a deeper understanding of how electrical components interact and how circuits function.













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In Science this week, Year 6 investigated how to build effective series circuits.

Pupils experimented with a range of components — including bulbs, buzzers, switches, and different lengths of wire — to explore how electrical circuits work and how component choices affect performance.

They were then set an exciting challenge "Who could create the brightest bulb and the loudest buzzer?"

Working collaboratively, groups tested different combinations, compared the effect of additional cells, and observed how resistance changes brightness and volume. Through hands on problemsolving, they developed a strong understanding of how electrical energy flows and how to optimise a circuit for a specific outcome.

The room *buzzed* with creativity and scientific thinking as Year 6 engineered their most powerful circuits yet!






















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🌞 Festive Fun in Year 6! 🌞




