






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Look at what else has been happening in school this week!





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Information Regarding Our School Attendance

Improving attendance and tackling persistent absence is at the centre of new stronger measures by the government since pupils returned to school in January. As a school we are legally obliged to monitor attendance and



must take action when a child's attendance drops below the level required by the government.

We, as a school have very supportive parents regarding attendance and are very grateful for that. Our parents agree that for most pupils, the best place to be is in school, surrounded by the support of their friends and teachers. However, as a parent it can be difficult to know when to send your child into school if they are feeling unwell or mildly anxious.

Finding solutions is a team effort between schools, parents and children and at Corpus Christi we will do whatever we can to help and support parents getting their child into school and on time.

It is usually safe for parents and carers to send their children to school with mild illnesses, like a minor cough, runny nose or sore throat. However, children should stay at home if they have a high temperature of 38C or above.

As part of our attempts to improve attendance please bear in mind the following information.

If you ring school to report your child being absent, we will need to take some details as the absence could, and this probably will generate a visit from a Welfare/Attendance Officer. We will ask where the child will be during the day either at home, at grandparents etc. so the Attendance/Welfare Officer can see the child.

You must answer the door if someone calls as due to safeguarding measures, they will ask to see whoever is absent. This is a legal requirement as part of our safeguarding duty, to see pupils who are absent. If you do not hear anyone knocking, they could possibly ring you from an 'Unknown' or 'Witheld' number. Please answer the phone to speak to them.

Safe Parking and dropping off at Corpus Christi PRIMARY School

We ALL agree the safety of our children arriving and leaving school is paramount.

Therefore, <u>we must ALL follow the same rules and laws regarding not parking</u> <u>and not stopping outside the school entrance.</u>

The times for this are on the information board outside the entrance.

8.00am-9.30am and 2.30pm - 4-00pm

Please observe these times to keep your child and all others safe, thank you.

The rules of the road as stated in the Highway Code are below

Waiting and parking (Rules 238 to 252) Rules for waiting and parking

Rule 243

DO NOT stop or park:

- near a school entrance
- anywhere you would prevent access for Emergency Services
- on the approach to a level crossing

Parking restrictions outside schools

Understanding yellow zigzag markings

Most school entrances and exits in the UK have yellow zigzag road markings with the writing 'School Keep Clear'.

Zigzags can be found at entrances and exits of schools, hospitals, fire stations, police stations and ambulance stations. <u>They indicate the part of the road where motorists should not wait, stop,</u> <u>or park a vehicle.</u>

Sometimes there may be an accompanying sign that shows specific times when these restrictions are in operation.
