

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Each week we send the children out with a 'mission' to actively live out their faith in their everyday lives.




Hope is a wonderful gift.

In the week ahead, our mission is to be a Pilgrim of Hope and share the love of Jesus with others through our kind actions, encouraging words or even just a smile





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As part of **Reception and Reception/Year 1's** learning about Chinese New Year they had the opportunity to make their own vegetable spring rolls with Mrs Gilby-Young from Classroom Kitchen.

First, they peeled and grated a carrot. Next, they cut up spring onions using the claw method and add lots of beansprouts. Then they cut up some coriander using scissors and Mrs Gilby-Young added the final ingredients of rice noodles, soy sauce and Chinese five spice. Once this was all mixed together it was time to make the spring rolls! The children each took it in turns to take a sheet of filo pastry, add the filling and fold and roll the pastry to make a spring roll. Oil was brushed on the top and they were all placed on a tray in the over for fifteen minutes to cook.

Once the spring rolls were cooked, the children tried their delicious spring rolls in their own mini banquet. The children had a wonderful time and thoroughly enjoyed their cooking lesson.





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This week in **Year 1** the children have been using different manipulatives to practically count on from a given number. They put the first number in their head and counted on from that number.







In Geograpgy, the children in Year 1 used the atlas to look at different maps, Then they focused on the UK and the different countries they would find there. After that, they learnt about the capital cities for each country in the United Kingdom.





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Year 2 Year 2/3 and Year 3 Visit to Armlev Mills

This week the children in **Year 2** visited the Leeds Industrial Museum to experience a Victorian Classroom. The children were able to dress as Victorian children and then they were given a penny to attend the class. They soon found out education had to be paid for and if they forgot their money, the children were punished!





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After going to school in the morning the children then went to work. They were introduced to the jobs they would have had if they were Victorian children. The children took jobs in the wool factory. They found out they would be in charge of some very big machinery which was often very dangerous for them. All the children were wonderfully behaved and excellent ambassadors for our school. We are so proud of them!

Thank you and well done Year 2/3 for representing our school so beautifully.



To top it off, some children even got to experience what it was like to face Victorian 'punishments'-quite the experience!





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<u>Year 3's Victorian Adventure at</u> <u>Armley Mills</u>

This week, **Year 3** had the fantastic opportunity to step back in time with a visit to Armley Mills where they learned about what life was like for children during the Victorian era. In the morning, the class spent time in a Victorian-style schoolroom where they experienced first-hand what it was like to be a pupil in the 1800s. The children practised their writing skills with slate boards and ink quills, just like children did in the past! Some of the children even volunteered to try out the strict punishments that were common in Victorian schools, adding an element of historical understanding to the lesson.

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In the afternoon, the class discovered the tough and often dangerous work that children did in the mills. They learned about the harsh conditions and the vital roles children played in the factory system. A highlight of the day was when the students got hands-on, helping to fill the carding machine and brush the wool, giving them a small taste of the challenging tasks these children faced.

It was an amazing experience which brought history to life for **Year 3** and helped them gain a deeper understanding of the schools in the Victorian era.

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



