What will I find out by the end of the unit? The Great Fire was caused by several factors (wind, summer weather, hygiene, width of streets, close proximity of buildings). After the fire there were many changes made in the rebuilding of London to prevent another fire. The diaries of Samuel Pepys have played a major part in our understanding of the events of the Great Fire of London. As young historians we must be aware of the problems with sources of information relating to any historical event. To place the Great Fire of London lasted just under 5 days and one-third of the city was destroyed. 100,000 people were made homeless. The monument in London is one way we commemorate the event to this day. The Great Fire helped to end the Plague in London by killing the rats and fleas which carried the disease.
