

### How do we remember: symbols

#### Special days

- 11th November is known as Armistice Day in the UK and Remembrance Day in Barbados. Many other nations across the Commonwealth and elsewhere mark this day
- On 18th May Poland commemorates the battle of Monte Cassino
- 25th April is Anzac Day in Australia

#### **Flowers**

- The poppy in the UK and in many Commonwealth Nations
- The cornflower in France, which is called the Bleuet de France
- The marigold in India and Pakistan

### How do we remember: monuments

A monument is a structure designed to remind people about an important person or event. They are often made of stone, but they don't have to be. Some monuments of Remembrance are:

- The Sikh war memorial and other statues
- Cenotaphs which are in towns and cities across the UK and around the world
- Poems written about service and sacrifice
- The Remembrance Glade in the National Memorial Arboretum



**GLOSSARY** 

**Glade:** an open space surrounded by trees **Arboretum:** a garden full of trees

# How do we remember: Sound and movement

Many ways to mark Remembrance include sound and music, these include:

- The sound of boots stamping in a cenotaph march-past
- Two-minute silence
- Music
- Dancing
- Bugle call
