Greetings from the Strive Team!

I would like to introduce the members of the SEND Department. I am Ms Oakes and I joined Derby Cathedral School in 2019. I joined as a History teacher, have been a



Head of Year and have recently started the exciting role of school SENDCo. I am fortunate to have a dedicated team who you can see in the photo above. We are a new team and are passionate about ensuring the needs of

our students are met both in and outside of the classroom. We work closely with Mr Hammerton, our new Assistant Headteacher who brings a wealth of experience of SEND and inclusion with him.

Strive means to make great efforts to achieve or obtain something and the Strive Team is dedicated to ensure we achieve this goal. We want the very best for our students with SEND and are currently completing the Assess, Plan, Do, Review (APDR) process. This means we assess individual student needs and we put a plan in place by consulting with parents in order to support each child's needs. We then carry out the plan and review student progress against the targets that each student is set. This process is entirely bespoke to each individual student and we are working closely with parents in order to support our students with SEND throughout the APDR process.

Each member of the Strive Team is a key worker for a number of students with SEND. This means that parents have a first point of contact to enquire about their child's progress in school. We are all easily contactable by email and always endeavour to respond promptly. A key worker's role is somewhat similar to that of a form tutor; we are there daily for students to come and talk to, we support students in the Strive Base throughout the school day and we keep in contact with parents regularly. We offer support, guidance and help to students daily and we work together to ensure students' needs are being met. We also communicate with all staff to ensure that key information and strategies for each child is widely shared and in order to do this, we have invested in new software that works alongside ClassCharts.

The role of our Teaching Assistants in lessons is to facilitate the learning that takes place in the classroom. This takes many forms such as sitting with students and explaining tasks differently so as to increase understanding, helping to break work down into more manageable chunks and providing scaffolding and support in order to help students succeed.

This year, we have created a brand-new sensory room. This room is an area where students can come and spend time to help regulate their emotions. It is proving to be a real success and is helping students who need a quiet, calm space to enable them to feel ready to continue with their learning. At break and lunch times we are always open to students who may feel that the main dining hall is a bit too busy for them and we have quite a few regular students who spend social times with us on a daily basis. This is a crucial element of what we do as it allows us the time to really get to know our students with SEND.

The students at Derby Cathedral School are at the very heart of all we do and the Strive Team is dedicated to their success.

A Murder Mystery at DCS!

On Thursday 3 November a deadly crime was committed after school hours! The night was a fantastic first live performance for the school and a great opportunity of our GCSE drama and music students to demonstrate their skills and experience a live audience for the first time.

A group of DCS families and staff arrived at the crime scene and were met by a number of 'police officers' who supported the lead detective in setting the scene for the audience.
