

What is cyber bullying?

Cyber bullying is bullying online. It often takes place outside of school and can happen at any time of the day. It can be done on apps such as: Instagram, Snapchat, TikTok, YouTube and online games.

Cyber-bullying can include the following.

- Where someone may be sending you:
 - threatening, upsetting or inappropriate messages, pictures or videos
 - silent or abusive phone calls
 - unpleasant messages via a chat room
- Someone could also be using your phone or email to send bullying messages to others to make them think that you are responsible.

If any of this is happening, you should save a screenshot of the evidence and tell your parent/carers or a member of staff immediately.

Introduction

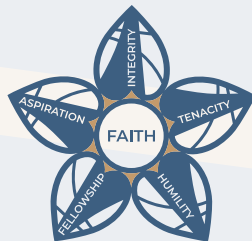
Derby Cathedral School does not accept bullying or intimidation in any form.

What is Bullying?

Bullying is the repetitive, intentional hurting of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power. It can happen face to face or online. (*Anti-Bullying Alliance*)

Bullying is NOT:

- A one-off argument
- A friend being nasty
- A dirty look in the corridor or playground
- Falling out with your friends in school or online.

These types of behaviours can be known as 'relational conflict'. We want to ensure our students know the difference between what is and isn't bullying, however our staff and Pastoral Team deal with any and all negative behaviours, whether they are bullying or not.

Signs someone is being bullied

These signs may indicate someone is being bullied.

- Not wanting to go to school
- Hiding or truanting
- Becoming anxious or lacking confidence
- Leaving school with damaged or missing possessions
- Cuts or bruises
- Lack of appetite
- Unwillingness to use the internet or mobile devices
- Change in behaviour and attitude at home

Although the signs outlined above may not be due to bullying, they are concerning and will be investigated.

How to put a stop to Bullying

Tell a member of the school staff immediately.

Never keep it a secret, always tell someone so we can put a stop to it. If you are being bullied don't try to deal with it yourself. You have got to tell an adult in school so they can help you straightaway.

How we deal with bullying

We will:

- Listen to you
- Speak sensitively to any witnesses and those involved
- Inform parents/carers
- Arrange sanctions, restorative work and support
- Keep a record of the bullying
- Monitor the situation and provide follow-up support

We must know what is happening so we can help you.
