



Mr. Cave's weekly message:

I wonder if like me, you've taken the time in this last week to watch the drama 'Adolescence' on Netflix. It's been discussed a lot in the news as it looks at the story of a tragic murder of a school girl by a 13 year old peer, and considers both the causes and consequences of this for families, schools and communities. If you haven't seen it, I really recommend it- a difficult watch that as a parent and educator spoke powerfully to me. It's coincided with items in the news of chilling acts of violence centred around young people and an incredibly complex set of consequences of the world we live in.

In interviews, the creators of the show have regularly referred to the phrase "it takes a village to raise a child". Our Home-School Agreement outlines the roles that both school and families play in helping a student succeed in school, and how we work collaboratively together to achieve this. Beyond this, I challenge all of us as parents to reflect on our engagement with our young people. How well have we created a climate where they can talk to us? Do we know what they are doing on their devices? How are we providing healthy role models for them around relationships and their own sense of self-worth, particularly cross genders? Being a parent is by far the greatest responsibility an adult takes on in life, and there are no tests to pass before you're allowed the job- we have to be committed to doing absolutely everything we can to make sure our young people are receiving healthy messages about themselves and their role in the world around them.

April - Month of the Military Child- Message from Mr McEvoy

As April is the month of the Military Child, I'd like to do something in school to celebrate our fantastic young people and give the Service Children a chance to feel recognised for their unique experiences. Many may not feel like they've done anything special, or that nothing has really happened to them, but we know that service life can present levels of challenges that they may not even understand are shaping them, and making the grow and adapt, as they become strong and resilient people.

Many schools have hosted poetry, writing and art competitions to highlight the experiences and all the extra add ons our Service Children might endure; things their peers might not even notice.

I don't want to add any extra strain or work to students, or make them share anything they've uncomfortable with, so I'd like to create a display board in the school that celebrates our students' connection to the military and HM Armed Forces.

It would be wonderful to see some photographs, maybe pictures of the service personnel with the child from years gone by, any old photos of them sat on a vehicle, in the barracks, on the base, or anything that connects our young people with their military heritage. I'll have to dig out the one of me in my Dad's beret sat on Herc rear ramp!

If they want to write to any little poems, or stories, or memories to go along with them, that would be lovely too.

We now face Corsham in the Mid Wilts Final on Wednesday 26th March at Beversbrook.




Primary outreach
