Key Vocabulary

Appeasement	The act of pacifying a country to avoid war
Blitz	The heavy military attack from the Germans
Bomb Shelter	An enclosed space built especially to protect people from a bomb
Censorship	The deliberate removal/stoppage of things being published
Evacuee	A person who has evacuated
Evacuation	The action of moving a person/ belongings from an endangered area
Propaganda	Information which is biased or misleading used to promote a political message.
Ration book	A book containing stamps to trade for food
Rationing	Allowing each person to have only a fixed amount of something

Map Blue - Allies Red - Soviet & Allies Black - Axis


Key Facts and Dates

- Hitler's actions threatened the peace in Europe
- Neville Chamberlain went to war 1st September 1939.
- The war was mainly fought in the air; more casualties and civilian damage
- Children's experiences of evacuation varied
- Rationing was widespread and helped equal out the food
- Women worked in factories (like they did in WW1)
- Air raid shelters limited the amount of casualties and deaths at home
- Germany were trying to cut off food supplies for the British
- Rationing helped give everyone an equal share
- Not everything written and created at the time was 100% true
- Government officials would 'stage' things to make it seem like the country wasn't daunted.
