Human Features

- Northern Scotland—tourism, fishing, weaving, oil rigs, cities Aberdeen, Inverness, Dundee, Caledonian Canal connects east and west.
- Southern Scotland
 – timber, fishing, wind farms, cities Glasgow and capital Edinburgh
- Wales— north and central sheep farming on hills. South more populous and industrialised, used to have coal mining, Britannia and Menai bridges connect to Anglesey.
- Northern Ireland
 — mix of rural and
 urban areas. Industry because land is
 suitable for building. Lough Neagh
 used for drinking water

Physical Features

- Northern Scotland—mountains, Ben Nevis (tallest mountain in the UK 1345m), islands, Loch Ness
- Southern Scotland—low hills, forests, River Tweed
- Wales— north and central mountainous, Mount Snowdon. South—Great Orme (headland), island of Anglesey
- Northern Ireland
 — rolling hills, low mountains, lakes (called loughs), largest lake in the UK by area (Lough Neagh), beaches,
