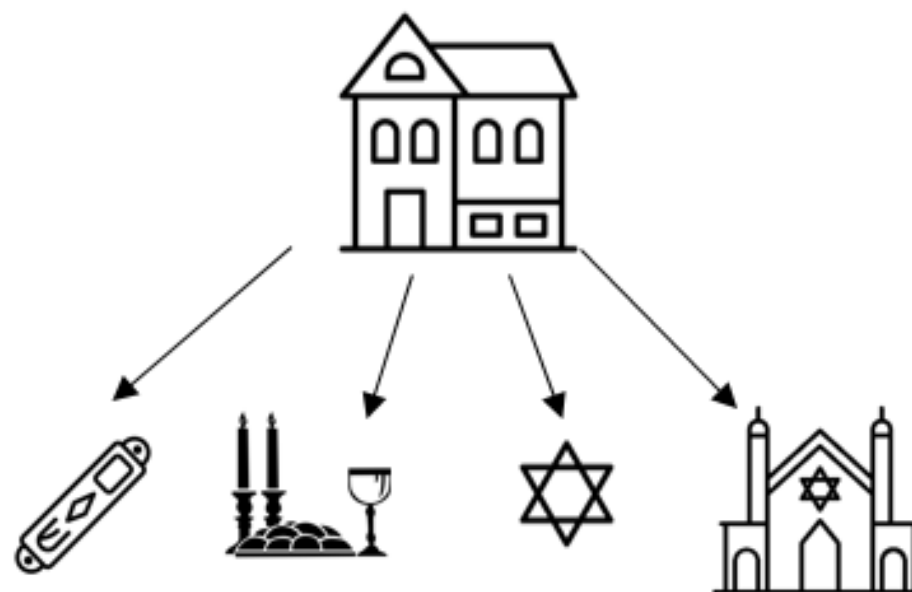

Key Vocabulary

Synagogue:	the Jewish place of worship, sometimes called a shul
Jewish	relating to the religion of Judaism.
Torah	the Jewish holy book made up of the five books of Law.
God	all powerful being who Jewish people believe created the world
Star of David	the recognized symbol of Judaism
Chanukah	Jewish festival that remembers the winning back of the Second Temple and the miracle of the tiny amount of oil.
