Subject purpose and aims:

Children at Devonshire Road come from a range of different backgrounds in an ever-changing, complex society. We aim to ensure that all pupils: develop competence to excel in a broad range of physical activities; are physically active for sustained periods of time; engage in competitive sports and activities and lead healthy, active lives, no matter what their race, religion, ethnicity, gender, socio-economic status or physical abilities are.

Our aims at Devonshire Road:

- To inspire all pupils to succeed and excel in competitive sport and other physically demanding activities.
- To provide opportunities for pupils to become physically confident in a way which supports their health and fitness.
- For pupils to compete in sport and other activities which build character and help to embed values such as fairness and respect.

Objective: To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools against 5 key indicators:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport

As a school, providing swimming lessons is a priority. Many of our children have never had lessons when they reach KS2 and some have never been in standing water. 32/60 children (53%) of the Year 6 cohort were able to achieve the end of KS2 expectation, which is an improvement from last year. This data should improve again next year with the addition of 3 year groups having lessons, rather than 2.	Swimming is a life skill that needs to be taught and achieved before children leave primary school and we are equipping the children with vital lifesaving skills they need if they were ever to fall in water.

These activities broadened their horizons to the amazing things that the human body can do when we push our limits and experience different physical activities. PE WOWs have been a huge success over the past years. The profile of PE has been raised and they have enabled children to take part in sporting activities they may not otherwise get to experience. Pupil questionnaires highlight the success of the WOWs completed so far with positive feedback. Pupil voice was collected after each trip to find out how successful it was at achieving its aims. All WOWs had a very positive impact. 282 children out of the 287 asked would like to try their WOW again as they either strongly enjoyed or enjoyed it (98%).
