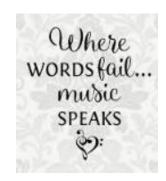

Pupils will have the opportunities to play instruments taught by a music specialist. In addition to this, they will explore the interrelated dimensions of music within their own compositions and appraise these in the performances of others.

Children will be able to discuss the works of famous composers and compare these to music from different cultures and historic periods.

Pupils will have the opportunity to explore instruments from around the world and those used in a full orchestra.

Overall, the children at Dowson have the opportunity to confidently express themselves through music and find music genres that appeal to them and support positive mental well-being.
