A Level Religious Studies: Philosophy of Religion, Religious Ethics and Development of Christian Thought

What is Philosophical Thinking? Philosophy literally means 'love of wisdom'. Its method is a critical approach to any area of study and it requires students to describe and analyse the views of others and then justify their own beliefs. Ethics is moral philosophy where ethical theories are used to answer the question "How should we live?". Central to both philosophy and ethics is an understanding of Christian thought. This is a multi-discipline subject. At its core is a keen critical eye that allows students to sharpen their understanding of the world that we live in from a philosophical and ethical viewpoint. However, the subject itself can be paired with any other subject studied. A Level RS is well respected for its ability to create independent critical thinkers that can solve problems in any academic discipline. This is a demanding course and requires a lot of reading and note taking.

<u>Students will develop:</u> Study skills, confidence in presenting ideas, critical thinking, essay writing, the ability to argue effectively, a stronger sense of what they believe is right or wrong and the greater ability to verbalise. There is a keen emphasis on spotting logical fallacies and flaws in argumentation, which allows students to develop their critical faculties through development of reasoned arguments.

<u>Course Requirements:</u> GCSE RE is not required. Success in the examinations is in no way dependent upon any religious faith or lack thereof. Minimum of a grade 5 at GCSE English Language is required and a grade 6 in any humanity subject.

Assessment Details:

There is no coursework – the assessment comes from 100% exam.

Candidates are required to answer three open-essay style questions for each area of the course at the end of the one year or two years study period.

Year 1: Three one hour 15 minute exams are sat in total each worth 60 marks or 33 1/3% of the AS level grade.

Year 2: Three two-hour exams are sat in total each worth 120 marks or 33 1/3% of the A level grade.

What can I do to prepare for AS Religious Studies?

Start by reading the specification at this <u>link</u>. There are a number of useful pieces of reading suggested on the *Suggested scholarly views, academic approaches and sources of wisdom and authority* sections at the end of each unit. You will not be able to access all of them (due to cost implications – you are not expected to buy any of the books on the suggested reading list) but a number of them are freely available. There is no expectation that you have read them all. Have a look and see what you think.

Don't worry if you don't understand anything you read. You're new to this. Write it down and ask when the term begins.

Read around the topics you will be studying – use the internet, newspapers and books to find out about the main philosophical and ethical issues and how they relate to current affairs. Good introductory books include: *Introduction to Philosophy and Ethics* by Mel Thompson; *Sophie's World* by Jostein Gaardner and *The Pig that Wants to be Eaten* by Julian Baggini. <u>SEP</u> is an excellent resource but is very heavy for beginners so use this if you find a particular area of interest for you that you would like to explore in more detail.
