How does Latin help you in your future career?

Learning languages gives you transferable skills; you develop the ability to think creatively and analytically, to see connections between communities, to translate across cultures and identities. Studying Latin also trains you to make links between language, literature and history, to analyse sources and to create a logical argument based on evidence.

What skills and knowledge will you gain from the course and how is it taught?

The GCSE course in Latin aims to develop the ability to understand original Latin texts, so that you can engage directly with evidence from the ancient world. You will become familiar with a basic core vocabulary of around 400 words and the most commonly used grammatical forms. You will also gain a sound understanding of life in the Roman world.

We aim to build confidence in translating Latin texts, based on a secure knowledge of grammar and vocabulary. We continue to use the Cambridge Latin Course through Y10. In Y11, we study the set sources for Paper 2 and revise the language.
