Sixth Form Societies

An integral part of life in Sixth Form is the array of societies that are set up and ran by Sixth Form Students. These include academic societies, sporting societies, mental health and general interest. Here are a few examples of things that students did last term.

Maths Society

So far in Maths Society we've delved into many different mathematical problems. We've explored primes and square numbers and how they influence the number of factors a number has in order to solve a door-opening and closing problem. We also discussed the Pigeonhole principle and its role in the proof of Friends and Strangers, a part of Ramsey Theory. In addition to that, we worked through a coin-flipping problem and through many coin-weighing problems, investigating the strategies for different scenarios, and how to minimise the number of moves.

Politics society

In Politics Society we have been able to successfully collaborate as a group with open, constructive discussions. We have covered the issues of the day as well as discussed broader topics through a political lens. The society is conveniently held on a Wednesday lunch time meaning we are able to watch and review Prime Minister's Questions. This provides an exciting opportunity for debates surrounding PMQ's in order to form collective judgements. This term we have specifically focused on the 6 questions from the opposition to the PM choosing a winner after each question is proposed and answered. This exercise has been a regular theme in our weekly sessions prompting us to review PMQ's analytically. This exercise still leaves time for us at the end of the session to open up the debate to more broader topics. Such topics include our regular coverage of the war in Ukraine in which we have followed the latest developments of and further discussion surrounding recent industrial action sparking a larger debate on topics such as nationalisation. Moreover, we have analysed recent polling figures as well as focussing in on specific local elections and how they can or cannot represent wider political trends. Overall, this term our society has proved to be one which is unique and exciting and we are all looking forward to carrying it on into the new year.

After being invited for a Channel 4 event in response to Jeremy Hunt's budget, I was inclined to go and intrigued to learn more. Not knowing what to expect, we took the train down to Darlington and walked to the Dolphin Centre. After sitting down with our complementary teas and coffees, we discussed what we were likely to participate in, having been given little information. To our surprise rather than having politicians analysing the budget whilst we listened, we were at a debate where we could all fully participate in. What I found the most interesting was hearing how economic decisions made on a political level had affected the young, the old, doctors, businesses, Conservative, and Labour voters. The broad array of backgrounds, professions, and ages meant I and my peers could contribute to the debate. Overall, it was a fascinating and thoroughly enjoyable experience to see politics from different perspectives that I would not normally be exposed to. Meeting Krishnan Guru-Murthy and discussing political issues with him was highlight of mine; the time he gave taking pictures with us and answering our question afterwards, highlighted the inclusivity of the event and the endeavour from the event to give us a voice.



Chem Soc

Over the term we have done presentations on Pauli's exclusion principle for electron orbitals and neurotoxins and nerve agents. We have also planned out many experiments including the use of hydrogen peroxide that we plan to do in the new year.

Multi-cultural society

This term we explored the various cultures shared by our diverse society members, such as customs and songs as well as how some cultural aspects are similar. From food to music to movies there are definitely different cultural aspects we would like to try out!

Engineering Society

The new Engineering Society started the first week after half term. We spent the first three weeks with a concept design task: creating a headphone holder to stop the wires from tangling. In groups, we designed the holders, and then built them in CAD software. We then had a session brainstorming plans for this year and, in the final session, we had the first end of term competition: design a "snowball" (cotton wool ball) launcher, furthest distance travelled wins (the year 12's won)! Next term, we will be starting our first big project, as well as holding a few more competitions, and some guest talks. This first term of this new society has gone brilliantly, and we can't wait to do more!

<u>Bio Soc</u>



This term in BioSoc, we've seen a wide range of presentations delivered by members of our society. The topics covered included symbiosis; the different species of penguin; mitochondria, and wolf populations in Italy. We tested our knowledge with quizzes, and by watching short clips about specific aspects of each talk that interested us.

Next year, we plan to look into genetics, including new discoveries in this field, as well as human anatomy and the

functions of different organs. New members are always welcome so feel free to come along in January!

History Society

This term in history society we have covered a range of subjects, spanning hundreds of years - from the Roman times to the modern day. We have explored Witches and the role of women within this as a source of medicine as well as scapegoats to blame. We have gone through the history of the shortest serving prime ministers, fitting alongside the current political landscape. Alongside this, in history society we have studied the role magic and superstition played in Roman life.

For example, this year we have dissected DAMN. by Kendrick Lamar, exploring his unique style and political opinion embedded within his art. The society provides a comfortable space where everyone to share their own opinion and openly discuss. Another element of the society is exploring the relevant history associated with the genre in order to give context and provide understanding. The first topic we explored was the creation of hip-hop as a genre, where it was created and what facilitated it with and the relation to the important context. The society is a judgement-free space to share your own interests of any art and express that interest. Alongside this, we also have had a few educating fun quizzes and games with prizes you can win. Most recently, we had a team game for musical artist ranking order, but we also have done independent games such as 'Guess the Sample' and 'Name the Album'.
