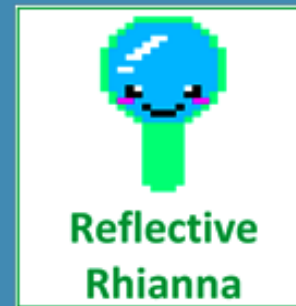

How to Help Your Child

Key Information

Children will sit assessments, set nationally, to determine whether they are working at the required standard.

These assessments support the teacher's overall judgement.

Reporting

Overall assessment of a child's attainment in English and Maths will be set out in their end of year report.

Assessments

At the end of Year 2, children will take assessments in reading, maths, spelling and grammar.

Assessments will take place between Monday 15th – Friday 19th May 2023

Writing is assessed by the class teacher and the English Lead, using national guidance.

What is meant by 'scaled scores'?

It is planned that 100 will always represent the 'national standard'.

Each pupil's raw test score will therefore be converted into a score on the scale, from 85 to 115.

A child who achieves the 'national standard' (a score of 100) will be judged to have demonstrated sufficient knowledge in the areas assessed by the tests.

Reading

The reading test consists of 2 separate papers:

Paper 1: consists of a combined reading prompt and answer booklet

Paper 2: consists of an answer booklet and separate reading booklet.

The texts will cover a range of poetry, fiction and non-fiction.

The papers will contain a variety of question types

Grammar Paper: Consists of a range of short questions to assess knowledge of punctuation and grammar.

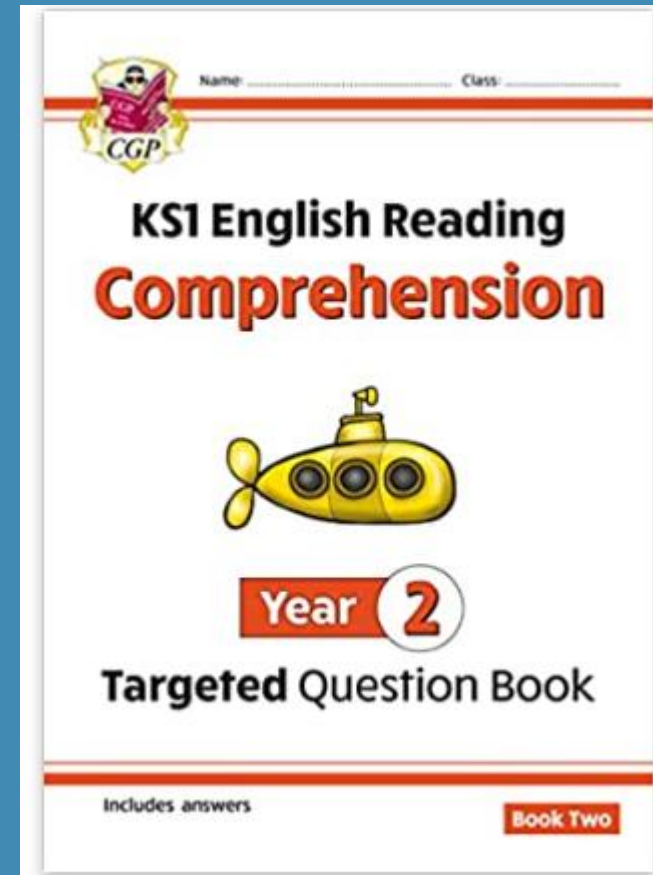
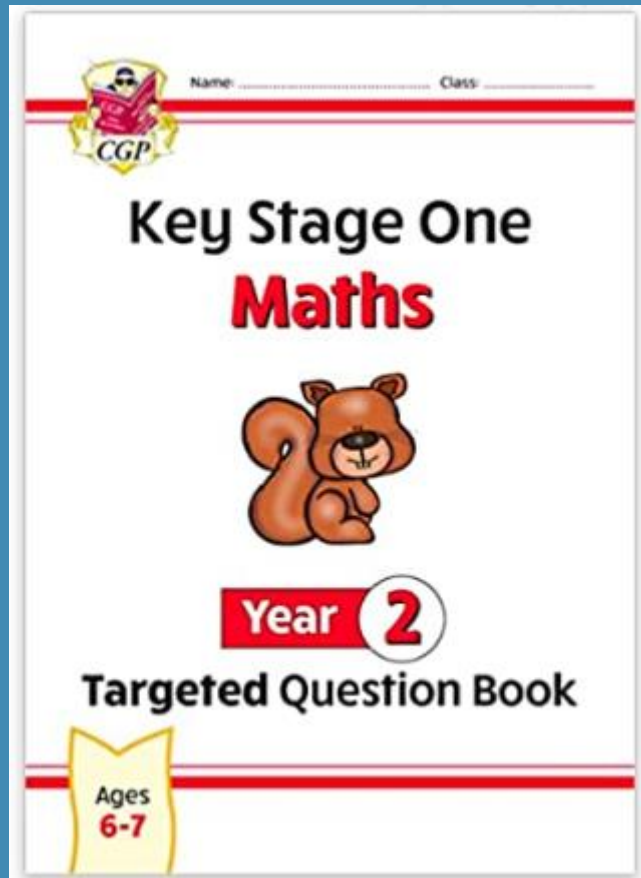
