Missing school means missing out . . .

As a parent it is your responsibility to ensure that you get your child to school each day . . . on time! It is also your responsibility to let the school know if they are going to be absent . . . and why. Please contact the school office on the first day

of any absence:

Unacceptable reasons for absence:

- Shopping
- Haircuts
- Birthday treats
- Visiting relatives
- Minor illness (coughs, etc.)
- Non-urgent medical / dental appointments (please book these during school holidays or after 3.15pm)
- Attending appointments with a sibling or parent

The only **acceptable** reasons for absence are:

- Illness
- Emergency appointment

Also:

ONLY THE SCHOOL CAN AUTHORISE AN ABSENCE

Did you know . . . ?

Government guidelines say that attendance should be at least 95%

If attendance drops below 90%, your child is classed as a persistent absentee and will be referred to the Education Welfare Service, and can lead to prosecution.

If your child's attendance is 90%, it means they are absent:

- Half a day every week.
- 19 days across the school year
- A total of 133 days across their time at East Whitby

Missing school means:

- Missing LEARNING . . . which leads to gaps in knowledge.
- Missing ACTIVITIES . . . which means missing out on fun.
- Missing **TIME WITH FRIENDS** . . . which means that they move on to new friends.

Term time holidays

Changes in the law mean that Headteachers can no longer authorise holidays in term time unless there are **exceptional** circumstances.

The following are **NOT** considered as exceptional:

- Lower costs
- Once in a lifetime experiences
- Holidays booked as a surprise by relatives

Parents of children who have regular unauthorised absences or who take their children on holiday in term time may receive a penalty notice and a fine of

£60 per parent, per child!

If a child has 10 days off school in a school year, they're actually spending more time at home than at school. Children are only in school for 190 days per year, **PLEASE** take them on holiday on some of the other 175 days!

Attendance matters

Children who attend school every day make better progress and achieve more than those who miss time at school.

Arriving late also causes problems. Children who arrive late disturb the lesson when they come in the room, which makes them feel uncomfortable and interrupts learning for others. It means that they miss important information at the start of lessons and it takes them longer to settle to work for the day. It means that if you are 15 minutes late each day you lose 9 ¹/₂ days of learning each school year!
