# Term Time Holiday and Penalty Notices

There have been amendments to the 2006 regulations in the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013. These amendments, as described below, came into force on 1 September, 2013.

#### Term Time holiday

Amendments to the 2006 regulations remove references to family holiday and extended leave as well as the statutory threshold of ten school days. The amendments make clear that headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. Headteachers should determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if the leave is granted.

#### Penalty Notices

Penalty notices may be issued to a parent as an alternative to prosecution for irregular school attendance under s444 of the Education Act 1996. They can only be issued in relation to pupils of compulsory school age in maintained schools, pupil referral units, academy schools, AP academies, and certain off-site places as set out in section 444A(1)(b).

A penalty notice must will be considered for absence of 10 sessions or more (usually equivalent to 5 school days) of unauthorised absence within a 10 week rolling period including INSET days. A penalty notice is an out of court settlement which is intended to change parental behaviour without the need for a criminal prosecution. The first penalty notice issued to the parent for a child will be charged at £80 if paid within 21 days, rising to £160 if paid between days 22 and 28.

Where it is deemed appropriate to issue a second penalty notice to the same parent for the same pupil within 3 years of the first offence, the second notice is charged at a flat rate of £160 and is payable within 28 days. There is no reduced sum available in this instance

A third penalty notice must not be issued within a 3 year period. Therefore, in cases where the threshold is met for a third (or subsequent) times within those 3 years, a penalty notice cannot be issued and alternative action may be taken instead. This will often include considering prosecution, but may include other tools such as one of the other attendance legal interventions.

## Absence from School

Please telephone the School Office (D13D4 61136D) by 9.00am to notify us if your child is absent for any reason on the morning of the absence. If you know prior to this of a medical appointment that may cause your child to be absent at registration then please also inform the School Office either by telephone the day before or by sending in a note. We will ask you to provide a copy of your child's appointment letter for their records as evidence of authorised absence. If you do not communicate with us we will telephone you, and other contacts you provide. There are two reasons why this is important:

- This could be the first notification that you have alerting you to the fact that your child has not reached school. In some cases we will ring a parent and nobody answers so please, for the safety of your child, keep us updated with contact details.
- If you have not explained your child's absence it becomes an unauthorised absence and may be reported as such to the Behaviour and Attendance Service. The School Liaison Officer becomes involved with persistent cases of unauthorised absence.

#### Unauthorised Absence

The Department for Children, Schools and Families (DCSF) requires us to keep a record of unauthorised absences. These are reported to the Local Education Office, and in the case of frequent absences, followed up by the School Liaison Officer.

Our absence rates (both authorised and unauthorised) for the last few years, which are low, are as follows;



# Lunchtime Arrangements

#### School Meals

Our meals are cooked in our school kitchen. There is always a choice and the meals are balanced and nutritious. Dinner money is preferably paid online direct to Whole School Meals at www.wholeschoolmeals.co.uk or collected in the morning and should be sent in an envelope clearly labelled with your child's name, class and amount sent in. Cheques should be made payable to 'Whole School Meals' and may be paid weekly or half termly. The present cost of a school meal is £2.50 or £12.50 per week. Children in Fledglings, Year 1 & Year 2 are entitled to a Universal Free School Meal.

Further information is available from the school office (this will be treated in the strictest confidence) for children whose family circumstances make them eligible for a free school meal, even if your child qualifies for the free Universal Free School Meal. We would encourage parents to claim for free school meals if you feel you may be eligible. As well as receiving a nutritious meal your child will receive milk at morning break and would currently be eligible for supermarket vouchers during the school holiday. All enquiries are treated in confidence.

#### Packed Lunches

Children bringing packed lunches should do so in a named strong packed lunch container. We ask parents to provide a healthy and balanced packed lunch which your child will enjoy eating. Please include some fruit in your child's packed lunch and do not send fizzy drinks, sweets, bars of chocolate or items containing nuts.



#### Snacks at Playtime

To emphasise good dental hygiene and nutritional habits children are not allowed to bring sweets into school. If they bring their own snack from home then these snacks must be fresh fruit or vegetables. Children in Fledglings and Years 1 and 2 receive free fruit in the afternoon as part of the government initiative.

#### Water

Children are encouraged to drink water in school. This helps provide oxygen to the brain for better learning and prevents children becoming dehydrated in warmer weather.

## Arrival and Departure from School

#### Arrival in School

Children are invited to arrive to school for 8.35am. To encourage independence, please say goodbye on the playground and allow your child to enter the class on their own. This kiss and drop off arrangement will be introduced when the Fledglings are ready. All children should use the pedestrian entrance on the Gun Park. Please do not drive your car into the school or use the main entrance as a turning area as many near misses have occurred. If you bring your child to school by car, please spare a thought for the residents of Cooks Lea. To avoid congestion, we ask you to park away from the school and walk with your child.

The bell rings at 8.50am and the pedestrian gate is locked. Children arriving after 8.50am must be accompanied to the school office.

Lateness causes problems for your child and the school. Being late means that lessons are disrupted and your child can often miss important instructions, information and explanations.

#### Early Morning Club

Early Morning Club is booked and paid for in advance. The cost is £1.20 a day (no breakfast is provided). Children should arrive after 8.00am via the school office.

#### Going Home

At the end of the day parents are welcome to wait on the playground for their child. Children are brought to the playground by their teacher. Please make sure your child and their teacher knows who will be collecting them at the end of the school day. If your child is allowed to walk home on their own please provide the school with written authority. Please make it a routine of doing a quick check for the following before leaving;

- Coats
- Jumpers
- Lunch boxes
- Home learning
- · Reading books
- Reading record

#### After School Clubs

We run a number of after school clubs throughout they year including ballet, football dance, home learning, multi-sports, netball, poetry, singing, and library. We do not charge for teacher led clubs but there may be a small fee for those clubs that are run by outside agencies. The available clubs change termly.

# Our School Building and Grounds



Our school is housed in one building.



The original building dates from the 1960s and contains our Key Stage 2 classrooms (Years 3, 4, 5 and 6), our hall, nurture room, kitchen and additional teaching areas. We have refurbished all our Key Stage 2 classrooms (Years 3, 4, 5 and 6). All classrooms have interactive whiteboards fitted in them.

The school hall is used for worship, PE, dance and drama, lunchtime meals and social functions.

The school kitchens are adjacent to the hall and our school dinners are cooked on site.





An extension, completed in 2004, houses a purpose built reception classroom (for our Fledglings) and classrooms for Key Stage 1 (Years 1 and 2). All classrooms have their own toilets.



Our library, the school office, head teacher's office, staff room and meeting room are to the right of the main entrance, near our quiet area. Unisex disabled toilets are also situated here.

We have 2 playgrounds, an outdoor classroom, a large field with 2 summerhouses, 3 small adventure

playgrounds, a woodland and two Forest School areas. The Fledglings and year 1 have their own outside covered classroom attached to their main classroom. We have a conservation area and our own vegetable plots and school garden, which the children take an active role in cultivating. We also have a school pond which attracts a range of wildlife for the children to enjoy and learn from.



### Forest School



Our carefully selected Forest School provides a happy, safe, sustainable environment that promotes a love and respect for each other and for our natural world. Our two Forest School areas are set within the school grounds and all children have weekly sessions at Forest School led by our specially trained Forest School teachers. Each area has clearly marked boundaries, incorporating numerous varieties of tree and wildlife species. The sites are organised into zones to promote different learning opportunities e.g. mud kitchen, fairy garden, tool area, den building and fire circle (to name a few).

# Maddie - Our School Dog!

One of the most loved staff members at Eastry is our school dog, Maddie. Every Monday Maddie joins the children in school, sitting in on lessons, hearing readers, being taken for walks and being cuddled. She thinks she has the

best job in the world!

Some of the benefits the children gain from having a school dog are; a sense of responsibility, a calming effect, improved behaviour, increased enthusiasm for animals, building confidence, helping children who may be upset, encouraging expression, participation and respect.

We also have two school guinea pigs, Oreo and Gingerbread. Our quinea pigs spend time in each class helping children to learn responsibility, providing emotional development, improving selfesteem and behaviour.

## Admissions to the School

Children are admitted to the school in accordance with the County Admissions Policy. Should we be over subscribed the following criteria apply:

- Looked after children or previously looked after children
- Current family association (an older brother or sister at the school)
- Health and Social Access Reasons (for which written evidence by a medical practitioner would be required)
- Nearness of the children's home to the school.

Parents will be informed about their child's place in April.

In line with Kent County Council guidelines, reception aged children usually start school in term 1. They follow a short part time induction programme which ensures they attend school for the required hours per week and this allows them to become accustomed to life at school.

# Teaching and Learning

At Eastry Church of England Primary School, we strive to meet the needs of all our pupils by providing a meaningful, engaging, broad and balanced curriculum.

We want all pupils to be able to reach their individual potential and build upon their strengths and interests, helping them to understand that we believe they can achieve and flourish in their education, thus encouraging their future aspirations as well as learning and developing essential life skills to enable them to be successful individuals.

We use the Early Year Foundation Stage and National Curriculum that is statutory for state schools and we plan inspiring and exciting topics to develop the skills, knowledge and understanding of all subjects across the school. Our aim is to ensure cross curricular opportunities and experiences to spark exciting and creative learning that will encompass the Foundation subjects, alongside the all-important English, Maths, RE and Science.

We promote positive emotional health and well-being to help children develop social and emotional skills throughout all subjects and also through PSHE sessions. As a church school, we support children's spiritual needs in our caring Christian environment that promotes our school ethos and vision. In our school we live out our vision alongside the British Values to enable our pupils to make informed choices and become respectful individuals.

Individual subject areas have been planned by the teachers and Subject Leaders. These are open to interpretation by the teachers, and topics may change depending upon world events and relevance to the children. Within this we find ways to maximise and enrich our learning opportunities by making use of our locality and our outdoor learning space.

### Educational Visits

Educational visits provide first hand and relevant experiences for our children. A number of visits are planned for each class throughout the year. We also offer a residential visit for Year 6.

Places we have visited include Dover Castle, Walmer Castle, Dover Museum, Wingham Wildlife Park, Kent Police Open Day, Kent Life, Samphire Hoe and the Mining Museum at Betteshanger.

Visits to the school by authors, poets, drama groups, sports athletes etc. are also arranged for our children.

There is no compulsory charge for the usual curriculum activities at our school. However, for some activities it is necessary to ask for voluntary financial contributions in order for the activity to take place. Whilst no child will be excluded from these activities, some events may have to be cancelled where there are insufficient voluntary financial contributions.





# Supporting Our School

The emphasis at Eastry is always on team work. We have an extremely supportive Governing Body and Parent Teacher Friends Association (PTFA), who take a very active role in all aspects of school life, enhancing the atmosphere of collective responsibilities and a sense of community.
