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Educational Visits

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Educational visits provide first hand and relevant experiences for our children. A number of visits are planned for each class throughout the year. We also offer a residential visit for Year 6, currently at 'The Swattenden Centre' near Cranbrook.

Places we have visited include Dover Castle, Dover Museum, Walmer Castle, Canterbury Cathedral, Broadstairs, Wingham Wildlife Park and The Beaney Museum in Canterbury.

Years 3 and 4 are also linked with a French Primary School in Lille. We visit the French school and they visit us.

Visits to the school by authors, poets, drama groups etc. are also arranged for our children.

There is no compulsory charge for the usual curriculum activities at our school. However, for some activities it is necessary to ask for voluntary financial contributions in order for the activity to take place. Whilst no child will be excluded from these activities, some events may have to be cancelled where there are insufficient voluntary financial contributions.

After School Clubs

We run a number of after school clubs, including cooking, dance, netball, science, art, football, golf and other sports. Most clubs are run by teachers for which there is no charge.

Early Morning Club

We also run an Early Morning Club where children can be dropped to school from 8.00am. There is a small charge of £1.00 per day and places need to be booked in advance (children should be given breakfast before they arrive).

Breakfast, afterschool and holiday clubs are run by a number of local nurseries.

Teaching and Learning

The Curriculum

We aim to meet the needs of every child by providing a broad and balanced curriculum so all children can experience success, build on strengths and come to terms with and improve their weaknesses.

The National Curriculum (2014) provides us with a framework of what is to be taught: Maths, English, Science, Computing, Art, Modern Foreign Languages, Music, Physical Education, History, Geography and Design and Technology. In addition our school curriculum includes Religious Education, Personal, Health and Social Education and Multi-cultural Education. Each area of the curriculum has an agreed school policy. Where possible, teachers plan cross curricular links which encourages links to be made between subjects.

Special Educational Needs

Children with Special Educational Needs (SEN) have access to a broad and balanced curriculum and are fully included in all the activities done at school.

Outstanding Quality First Teaching ensures all children are fully supported with in whole class teaching.

Children with an Educational Health Care Plan are provided with differentiated programmes to meet the objectives of their plan. SEN, with support, provides, if necessary, programmes and differentiation for children with additional and different needs and also access to outside agencies and professionals.

Our SEN policy and provision are monitored and organised by our Special Needs Co-ordinator.

The children's learning needs are supported in class, in groups, and sometimes individually by our teachers and our teaching assistants.

Term Time Holiday and Penalty Notices

There have been amendments to the 2006 regulations in the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013. These amendments, as described below, came into force on 1 September, 2013.

Term Time holiday

Amendments to the 2006 regulations remove references to family holiday and extended leave as well as the statutory threshold of ten school days. The amendments make clear that headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. Headteachers should determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if the leave is granted.

The Education (Penalty Notices) (England) Regulations 2007

Amendments have been made to the 2007 Regulations in the Education (Penalty Notices) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013. These amendments, as described below, came into force on 1 September, 2013.

The 2007 regulations set out the procedures for issuing penalty notices (fines) to each parent who fails to ensure their children's regular attendance at school or fails to ensure that their excluded child is not in a public place during the first five days of exclusion.

Amendments to 2007 regulations have reduced the timescales for paying a penalty notice. Parents must, from 1 September, 2013, pay \pounds 60 within 21 days or \pounds 120 within 28 days. This brings attendance penalty notices into line with other types of penalty notices and allows local authorities to act faster on prosecutions.

You can see from the above amendments to the regulations the Government continues with their advice that holidays or any other type of leave must not be taken in term time, unless there are exceptional circumstances and actively encourages Headteachers not to authorise any requests.

Absence from School

Please note that it is your responsibility to telephone the School Office (01304 611360) to notify us if your child is absent for **any** reason on the **morning** of the absence. If you know prior to this of a medical appointment that may cause your child to be absent at registration then please also inform the School Office either by telephone the day before or by sending in a note. If you do not communicate with us we will telephone you (we must have a **current** telephone number to contact you on). There are two reasons why this is important:

• This could be the first notification that you have alerting you to the fact that your child has not reached school. In some cases we will ring a parent and nobody answers so please, for the safety of your child, let us know where to contact you.

• If you have not explained your child's absence it becomes an unauthorised absence and may be reported as such to the Behaviour and Attendance Service. The School Liaison Officer becomes involved with persistent cases of unauthorised absence.

Unauthorised Absence

The DCSF requires us to keep a record of unauthorised absences. These are reported to the Local Education Office, and in the case of frequent absences, followed up the School Liaison Officer.

Our Aims

Our school is a family where children and adults will learn together. We aim to do this by:

- Making our environment attractive and stimulating to support and celebrate the children's learning.
- Helping develop the children into responsible, independent and confident individuals.
- Providing equal opportunities for all.
- Showing compassion, respect and understanding for others.
- Ensuring the school is a vital part of the local community.

- Ensuring children are happy and joyful in school
- Ensuring we are fully inclusive and welcome all into our school.

Behaviour in School

Our core values are mutual respect, self-discipline and social responsibility and these are reflected in 'Our School Values.' Everyone who is part of the school works together to promote these. We have clearly defined boundaries of acceptable behaviour and the teachers respond promptly and firmly to children who test these boundaries. The vast majority of our children are praised and rewarded rather than reprimanded.

Our School Rules are:

- Value, respect and show compassion for each other.
- Always do our best and persevere.
- Listen when someone is talking.
- Understand we have kind hands, feet and thoughts.
- Everyone be honest and tell the truth.
- Smile, be joyful and welcome everyone into our school.

As a school we will work with parents to encourage in children a positive attitude towards school that embraces:

- Respect for themselves and others
- Positive attitude towards work
- A growing self reliance
- Respect for the property of others
- Politeness/manners suitable for the occasion
- A regard for personal safety and the safety of others.

<u>Toilets</u>

Each class has its own set of toilets. Should your child have an accident in school and soil themselves we do ask the parents to come in and change them.

Lunchtime Arrangements

School Meals

Our meals are cooked in our school kitchen. There is always a choice and the meals are balanced and nutritious. Dinner money is collected in the morning and should be sent in an envelope clearly labelled with your child's name, class and amount sent in. Cheques should be made payable to '**Whole School Meals**' and may be paid weekly or half termly. The present cost of a school meal is £2.30 or £11.50 per week. All meals must be paid for in advance. You can also pay on line at www.wholeschoolmeals.co.uk. Children in Fledglings, Year 1 & Year 2 are entitled to a Universal Free School Meal.

Forms are available from the office for children whose family circumstances make them eligible for a free school meal even if your child qualifies for the free Universal Free School Meal. All enquiries are treated in confidence.

Packed Lunches

Children bringing packed lunches should do so in a named strong packed lunch container. We ask parents to provide a healthy and balanced packed lunch which your child will enjoy eating. Please include some fruit in your child's packed lunch and do not send fizzy drinks, sweets or bars of chocolate.

Snacks at Playtime

To emphasise good dental hygiene and nutritional habits children are not allowed to bring sweets into school. If they bring their own snack from home then these snacks must be healthy and should not be crisps, biscuits etc. Children in Fledglings and Years 1 and 2 receive free fruit as part of the government initiative.

Water

Children are encouraged to drink still bottled water in school. This helps provide oxygen to the brain for better learning and prevents children becoming dehydrated in warmer weather. The school provide the children with a water bottle when they start school. Replacement tops can be purchased costing 50p and replacement water bottles (including lid) cost £2.00.

Our Buildings and Grounds

Our school is housed in one modern building. The original building dates from the 1960s and contains our Key Stage 2 classrooms (Years 3, 4, 5 and 6), our library, our computer suite, our hall and kitchen and additional teaching areas. We have refurbished all our Key Stage 2 classrooms (Years 3, 4, 5 and 6) and these rooms are air conditioned. All classrooms have interactive whiteboards fitted in them.



The school hall is used for worship PE, dance and drama, lunchtime meals and social functions.

The school kitchens are adjacent to the hall and our school dinners are cooked on site.



An extension, completed in 2004, houses a purpose built reception classroom (for our Fledglings) and classrooms for Key Stage 1 (Years 1 and 2).



The school office, head teacher's office, staff room and meeting room are to the right of the main entrance, near our quiet area. Unisex disabled toilets are also situated here.

We have 2 playgrounds, an outdoor chess board, a large field with 2 summerhouses and a Fairtrade garden, 3 small adventure playgrounds and a woodland area. The Fledglings have their own outside covered classroom attached to their main classroom. We have a conservation area and our own vegetable plots and school garden, which the children take an active role in cultivating.



Arrival and Departure from School

Arrival in School

Children are invited to arrive to school for 8.35am, To encourage independence, please say goodbye on the playground and allow your child to enter the class on their own. This kiss and drop off arrangement will be introduced when the Fledglings are ready. All children should use the pedestrian entrance on the Gun Park. Please do not drive your car into the school drive or use the main entrance as a turning area as many near misses have occurred. If you bring your child to school by car, please spare a thought for the residents of Cooks Lea. To avoid congestion, we ask you to park away from the school and walk with your child.

The bell rings at 8.50am and the pedestrian gate is locked at 8.55am. Children arriving after 8.55am must go to the school office.

Lateness causes problems for your child and the school. Being late means that lessons are disrupted and your child can often miss important instructions, information and explanations.

The Local Authority provides a taxi service to and from school for those children who live in Tilmanstone and Woodnesborough

Early Morning Club

Early Morning Club should be booked in advance. The cost is £1.00 a day (no breakfast is provided). Children should arrive after 8.00am via the school office.

Going Home

At the end of the day parents are welcome to wait on the playground. Children in Fledglings, Years 1 and 2 are brought to the playground by their class teacher. Key Stage 2 children will make their own way to the playground. Please make sure your child and their teacher knows who will be collecting them at the end of the school day.

School Council

The reasons for this are quite straight forward:

•The Foundation Stage curriculum requires outdoor play, digging and lots of first hand experience, clothes will get dirty and tracksuits are more robust.

• It is easier for the child to get changed for PE (no buttons to undo) and this is part of the Early Learning Goals.

• Young children learn through being active.

• Large scale movements such as climbing under, through, around and between are required.

Complaints Procedure

The Governing Body has a complaints procedure in line with KCC recommendations. Though we hardly ever get complaints about the school it is necessary to have such a procedure in place to make it fair for everyone. Admissions to the School

Children are admitted to the school in accordance with the County Admissions Policy.

Should we be over subscribed the following criteria apply:

- Children in local care.
- Current family association (an older brother or sister at the school)
- Health reasons (for which a medical certificate may be needed); parental health is not a criterion.
- Nearness of the children's home to the school.

Parents will be informed about their child's place in April.

In line with Kent County Council guidelines, reception aged children usually start school in term 1. They follow a short part time induction programme which ensures they attend school for the required hours per week and this allows them to become accustomed to life at school.
