1	School reopening after easing of restrictions	4	3	12	 Where necessary the building has been deep cleaned before reopening. All staff are competent and instructed with regards to the procedures in place for the protection against infection from Covid-19. Home testing risk guidance has been produced. Parents will be made aware that due to increased natural ventilation, students should wear adequate clothing. From September, breakfast and after-school provision will operate as normal. The wearing of face coverings is encouraged in recommended circumstances; the classroom and communal areas. Face coverings are not required during PE. Face coverings should be worn in communal areas by staff, visitors, and encouraged to be worn by students and all those over the age of 12 are expected to wear face coverings on public transport (and dedicated school transport) unless they are exempt. School will ensure it has a small contingency stock of face coverings available if an individual has forgotten or damaged their own. Staff will be encouraged to socially distance when in teaching areas and communal spaces where possible. School will continue to regularly clean areas and equipment thoroughly including frequently touched surfaces. School will produce an outbreak management plan which will include the measures required following an outbreak as a result of several confirmed cases over a 10 day period. All extra-curricular activities and out of school provision will not require children to be allocated to a bubble. Staff and students involved in activities should continue to test at home twice weekly. Close contacts will be identified by NHS Test
 Close contacts will be identified by NHS test and Trace. Children under the age of 18 years and 6 months old will no longer be required to self-isolate if they are contacted by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact.

 From Tuesday 14 December, people who are fully vaccinated (no booster required) and identified as a contact of someone with COVID-19 – whether Omicron or not – should take an NHS rapid lateral flow test every day for 7 days to help slow the spread of COVID-19. School will encourage vaccine take up and enable staff who are eligible for a vaccination to attend booked appointments where possible (even if during term time). Working from Home Staff required to self isolate and are fit enough, they are expected to sel live lessons for their classes. Only with prior agreement with the Headteacher, staff who can work from home should do so from Monday 13 December. Anyone who cannot work from home should continue to go into work. People previously considered to be particularly vulnerable, clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV), and high or higher-risk are not being advised to shield again (any personal advice from a specialist or clinician on additional precautions to take should continue to be followed). 	
 Contingency Plans For individuals or groups of self-isolating students, remote education plans are in place and school will provide this provision when necessary. School will produce an outbreak management plan which will include the measures required following an outbreak as a result of several confirmed cases over a 10 day period. School will revisit its outbreak management plan and keep informed of changes within the contingency framework guidance, to ensure it is well prepared for any future changes. Ventilation 	

 Adequate ventilation is provided whilst students and staff are on site. Windows may be partially opened in conjunction with heating systems to maintain a comfortable balance. School will ensure any events held in the school i.e. plays etc will be in a location where ventilation is maximised. If possible, systems will be adjusted to full fresh air or, if this is not possible, then systems will be operated as normal as long as they are within a single room and by an outdoor air supply.
 Testing As part of Government's guidelines All staff and students will have access to coronavirus tests and will be encouraged to test twice weekly at home. The school will provide students with home testing kits where supply is available and they will be asked to test twice per week. Tests should be completed 3 to 5 days apart (min 3 days), in accordance with government guidelines. School will consider the need to retain a small asymptomatic testing site (ATS) on-site so students who are unable to test themselves at home can be offered a test in school (this may be required in very limited circumstances). School will test students on site upon return from the Christmas holiday period. Testing is only for those students with parental consent. School will ensure a sufficient supply of test kits will be provided to enable staff and students to test over the Christmas holiday period. School will ask parents, guardians and other visitors to take a lateral flow device (LFD) test before entering school. Home testing guidance has been produced.
self-swab and test themselves twice a week at home and will report their result to NHS Test and Trace as soon as the test is completed, this will

 be either online or by telephone as indicated in the home test kit. Staff and students will be required to notify school if their result is positive. Contact tracing will be completed by NHS track and trace. PCR tests are available via the gov website or via local testing centres. NOTE: if a PCR test is taken within 2-days of a positive lateral flow test, and is negative, it overrides the self-test LFD and staff and pupils can return to school as long as they don't have COVID-19 symptoms. Close contacts will be identified by NHS Test and Trace. Staff and pupils are not required to self-isolate if they live in the same household as someone with COVID-19, or are a close contact of someone with COVID-19, and any of the following apply: > they are below the age of 18 years and 6 months > they have taken part in or are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial they are not able to get vaccinated for medical reason From Tuesday 14 December, people who are fully vaccinated (booster not required) and identified as a contact of someone with COVID-19. If contacted by NHS Track and Trace, staff and pupils (parents) will be informed they have been in close contact with a positive case and advised to take a PCR test. School will encourage all individuals to take a PCR test if advised to do so.

Staff who do not need to isolate, and children and young people aged under 18 years 6 months who usually attend school, and have been identified as a close contact, will be advised to continue to attend school as normal. They will not be required to wear a face covering whilst in school however, it is expected and recommended that these are worn when travelling on public or dedicated transport. Symptomatic individuals and those who record a positive test result will still be required to self-isolate.

Children under the age of 18 are exempt from quarantine on returning to England from amber countries. Staff who have been fully vaccinated with an NHS administered vaccine in the UK (plus 14 days) or are on a formally approved UK vaccine clinical trial, returning to England from amber list countries no longer need to quarantine. It is recommended that school do not go on any international visits this academic year up to and including 5 September 2021. Those aged 11 to 17 need proof of a negative COVID-19 test to travel to England (children aged 10 and under are exempt from this) and those aged 5 to 17 must take a COVID-19 travel test on or before day 2.
