

School Trips


Staircase House, Stockport Great Fire of London Workshop Friday 27th February 2026

Pupils will visit a local church to spot key features such as stained glass and the font and take part in an interactive experience to learn about Christian celebrations and traditions.




Safety Central - KS1 Safety Workshop Wednesday 24th June 2026

Reading in Class

- Phonics will continue throughout Autumn Term 1.
- From Autumn Term 2 onwards, the phonics sessions become spelling lessons.
- The focus in Year 2 moves from decoding to greater fluency and comprehension.
- Children will be benchmarked every term or earlier if we believe they are ready.

Your child's reading level has recently been assessed at **Book Band Level _____.**From now on, they will be bringing home **two reading books each week** for you to enjoy together at home. Your child's day to bring in their reading folder to swap their books is ______.

We ask that you spend around 15 minutes each evening reading the books together. I recommend reading each book three times to get the most out of it:

- Day 1 Explore the book together: Share the story, look at tricky words, and talk about the meaning of unfamiliar words or phrases.
- Day 2 Re-read the book: This time, focus on building fluency and expression. Encourage your child to read
 with confidence.
- Day 3 Extend the learning: Re-read the book again to build fluency. Then ask comprehension questions, which
 you can find at the front or back of the reading book.

Please log each reading session on the **Boom Reader parent app**. Make sure you log in using **parent mode** (not pupil mode). When logging, please record:

- The pages read
- Any tricky words encountered (optional)
- Any other comments you would like to share (optional)

Learning how to make decisions when it comes to spending, budgeting and saving money and exploring different career choices.

KS1 SATS

- In May 2026, all Year 2 children will take part in the Key Stage 1 SATS. These are national assessments that help teachers understand you child's progress in reading, writing, maths and spelling, punctuation and grammar (SPaG).
- The SATS are designed to be as child-friendly as possible and are carried out in small groups or individually, often without children even realising they are being assessed. Teachers then use the results, alongside daily classroom work, to make their final judgements about your child's attainment.



KS1 SATs

Reading:

- Paper 1: A short text with questions
- Paper 2: A longer text with a separate booklet of questions
- These assess you child's understanding of what they read, including retrieving information, making inferences, and explaining meanings.

Maths:

- Paper 1 (Arithmetic): Focuses on number skills such as addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.
- Paper 2 (Reasoning): Uses problems and word problems to test how children apply maths in reallife contexts.
- Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar (SPaG):
 - · Paper 1 (Spelling): children spell words in sentences as read aloud by the teacher.
- Paper 2 (Grammar, Punctuation and Vocabulary): A short, written test checking understanding of sentence structure, punctuation and word choices.

KS1 SATS

- How you can support at home:
 - Read regularly with your child and talk about the story together,
 - Practise quick recall of number facts (such as number bonds to 10 and 20)
 - Encourage your child to write in everyday contexts (shopping lists, notes, stories).
 - Celebrate effort and progress, not just correct answers, to build confidence.
- We will provide further details and guidance closer to the time to help you and your chid feel fully prepared.

P.E. Days

- P.E. days will generally be a Wednesday (with Mrs Sumser) & Friday (with Multiflex)
- These days are subject to change due to staff CPD & subject leadership schedule
- Parents to be notified via See-Saw of the specific weekly P.E. days at the beginning of each half term



Homework



- Reading: 10-15 mins every day (log on Boom Reader Parent app every time they read)
- Every Friday children will receive a mixture of paper-based tasks that will complement and
 consolidate their class learning. This may also include links to online task, such as Maths.co.uk. Please
 come and speak to me if you feel this does not work for your child we don't want homework to be
 stressful for children and families.
- I suggest that children break up the tasks throughout the week, or if they prefer to, they could complete it in one/two longer sessions.
- Once completed, I encourage families to check through the answers together, discuss any
 misconceptions and correct any errors (in a different colour pen if possible). This helps the children
 to build good learning habits, strengthens their understanding and teaches them to see mistakes as
 chances to learn and grow. To aid this practise, homework answers will be posted onto Seesaw each
 week for parents to use with their children.
- Children should return their marked paper copy to school by the following Friday.


