Topic Theme and Intent	Students will explore the nature of UK Government . Students will analyse the set of rules governing politics in the UK, the UK constitution , and the specific roles and powers of the different major branches of the government – legislative , executive , and judiciary – as well as the relationships and balance of power between them.	Students will explore the nature of politics and how people engage in the political process in the UK. Students will explore the emergence and development of the UK's democratic system and the similarities, differences, connections and parallels between direct and indirect democracy. They will focus on the role and scope of political parties that are so central to contemporary politics, including the significance of the manifestos they publish at election time and their relevance to the mandate of the resulting government.	Students will explore the three traditional political ideas of conservatism, liberalism and socialism as well as one non-core political idea from a range of options. Students will learn about the core ideas and principles and how they apply in practice to human nature, the state, society and the economy, the divisions within each idea and their key thinkers.


