Topic Theme and Intent	Students will explore the nature of the US Constitution and Federalism. Students will analyse the set of rules governing politics in the USA and the specific roles and powers of the different major branches of the government – legislative (Congress) and the executive (Presidency as well as the relationships and balance of power between them. Students will study comparative theory and compare the US Constitution, the Legislative and the Executive branches to their UK counterparts.	Students will study the role of the Supreme Court and how civil rights are protected by the Judiciary. Student will examine how the Supreme Court has power over both state and federal government. Students will explore the nature of politics and how people engage in the political process in the USA. They will focus on the role and scope of The Republican and Democrat political parties, political participation and the road to the Presidency. Students will study comparative theory and compare the Judiciary and political parties to their UK counterparts.	We will revisit and revise areas of the syllabus to enable students to further embed the knowledge and the skills needed in readiness for the exams so that students are confident about how to approach the exam questions. Topics will be re taught if considered necessary. Focus will be on exam skills including accurately reading the question, knowing what to include, addressing the assessment objectives etc
