

<h3>Geography - Coastal Erosion</h3> <p>In Autumn 2, children will learn what coastal erosion is and how it changes the shape of the coastline over time. They will explore the different processes of erosion, including hydraulic action, abrasion, attrition, and solution, and consider how waves, tides, and weather contribute to these changes. Pupils will study the landforms created by erosion, such as caves, arches, stacks, and stumps, and investigate how erosion affects people, homes, and the environment. They will also learn about different methods humans use to manage and reduce erosion, such as sea walls and groynes, and use maps, diagrams, and case studies to explain where and how coastal erosion takes place.</p>	<h3>Languages - French</h3> <p>In this unit, the children will be learning how to ask and answer questions about pets in French using the phrase <i>As-tu un animal?</i> They will practise key phonics sounds to improve their pronunciation and will learn the names of common animals such as <i>un chien</i>, <i>un chat</i>, <i>un poisson</i> and <i>un oiseau</i>. Through games, repetition and simple conversations, they will build confidence in speaking and listening, while also beginning to create short dialogues to talk about the pets they have or don't have. By the end of the unit, children will be able to recognise and say a range of animal names, ask others if they have a pet, and respond appropriately using full sentences in French.</p>	<h3>PE - Fundamentals</h3> <p><b>Fitness</b> Develop attacking principles, understanding when to run and when to pass. Use the 'forward pass' and 'offside' rules. Play games using tagging rules. Develop dodging skills to lose a defender. Develop drawing defence and understanding when to pass.</p> <p><b>Indoor Athletics</b> Children will develop range of skills including; running, jumping, and throwing events such as sprints, relays, standing long jump, and chest push. The focus is on improving personal performance, working as a team, and understanding the importance of fitness, fair play, and perseverance. It's a great way to build confidence, coordination, and a love for physical activity indoors.</p>
<h3>Science - Forces</h3> <p>In this unit, pupils will learn about the effects of forces on objects, including gravity, air resistance, water resistance, and friction. They will explore how forces can slow objects down, speed them up, or change their direction. Pupils will investigate the role of mechanisms such as levers, pulleys, and gears in making work easier and will carry out practical experiments to observe and measure different forces in action. Through these activities, they will develop their ability to make predictions, take measurements, and draw conclusions based on evidence.</p>	 <p><b>Kestrel Class - Autumn Term 2 Curriculum Overview</b></p>	<h3>RE - Christianity</h3> <p>In this unit, pupils will learn about key beliefs and practices within Christianity, exploring how these influence the lives of Christians today.
