Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	52% Sep 24	This is based upon end of Year 5 data

Have you done this?	Yes	Year 4 receive swimming sessions.  Due to pupil numbers in Year 4, we are able to offer top-up swimming lessons to pupils in Year 5 and 6 who did not meet the expected standard when they were in Year 4. This has improved our percentage of the current Year 6 cohort who can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 meters to 67%. In our current Year 5 cohort, 52% of pupils can swim the 25m.

Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?		All swimming lessons are provided by fully qualified staff based at the pool. School staff support with building confidence in the pool
