Personal, Social, Emotional Development	By the end of Nursery, the children will be expected to select and use activities and resources, with help when needed. Develop a sense of responsibility and membership of a community. Show more confidence in new social situations and become more outgoing with school staff. The children will have opportunities to play with other children, to help extend and elaborate their ideas. The children will be familiar with our school rules and be able to follow these on most occasions. The children will be encouraged to solve conflicts and talk about their feelings. They will begin to understand how others may feel.					
Communication and Language	By the end of Nursery, the children will be able to listen to longer stories and remember what has happened. The children will be able to use a wider range of vocabulary and understand a question or instruction that has two parts. They will be able to sing a large repertoire of songs and know many rhymes. The children will be able to talk about familiar books, and be able to tell a long story. They will be able to use longer sentences of four to six words. Children will have the opportunity to express a point of view and to debate when they disagree with an adult or a friend. They will be able to start a conversation with an adult or a friend and use talk to organise themselves and their play.					
Physical Development	By the end of Nursery, the children will have opportunities to develop their movement, balancing, riding and ball skills. They will be able to use various resources to help their large-muscle movements. The children will take part in group activities which they can make up for themselves, or in teams. They will be able to use and remember sequences and patterns of movements which are related to music and rhythm. Match their developing physical skills to tasks and activities in the setting. Collaborate with their peers to manage large items. The children will have opportunities to access one-handed tools and equipment. The children should be able to use a comfortable grip with good control when holding pens and pencils. They should be able to show a preference for a dominant hand. The children will be encouraged to be independent when putting on their coats, PE pumps, using the toilet and washing their hands thoroughly. The children will have had opportunities to learn about healthy food choices, drink, activity and toothbrushing.
