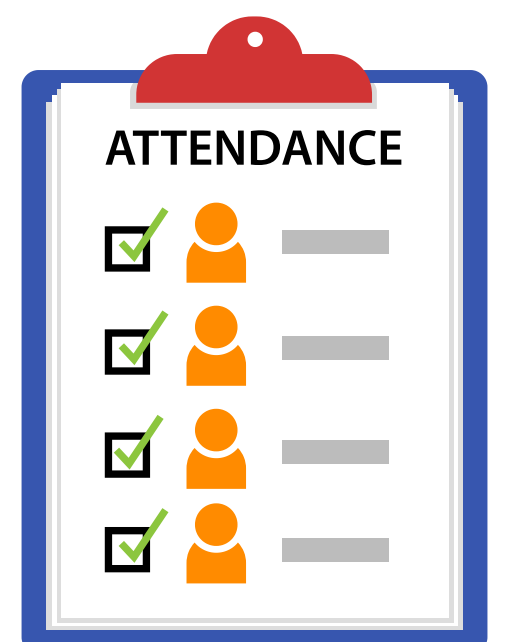

## INTEGRATING READING INTO DAILY ACTIVITIES

WE UNDERSTAND THAT FAMILIES HAVE BUSY LIVES AND DIVERSE ROUTINES, BUT INTEGRATING READING INTO YOUR DAILY ACTIVITIES CAN BE A FUN AND MANAGEABLE WAY TO NURTURE YOUR CHILD'S LOVE FOR BOOKS. HERE ARE SOME SIMPLE AND CREATIVE WAYS TO INCORPORATE READING INTO EVERYDAY MOMENTS, SUITABLE FOR ALL FAMILIES

### STORYTELLING DURING MEALS

USE MEALTIME AS AN OPPORTUNITY TO TELL STORIES. YOU CAN TAKE TURNS CREATING A STORY TOGETHER, WITH EACH FAMILY MEMBER ADDING A SENTENCE. THIS ACTIVITY ENCOURAGES CREATIVITY AND ACTIVE LISTENING.

### BEDTIME STORIES

BEDTIME IS A PERFECT TIME FOR A CALMING STORY. READING A BOOK TOGETHER BEFORE SLEEP CAN BECOME A CHERISHED ROUTINE, HELPING YOUR CHILD UNWIND AND LOOK FORWARD TO BEDTIME

### AUDIOBOOKS ON THE GO

WHETHER YOU ARE ON A SHORT TRIP TO THE SHOPS OR A LONGER JOURNEY, AUDIOBOOKS ARE A GREAT WAY TO ENJOY STORIES TOGETHER. THEY CAN TURN CAR RIDES INTO AN ENGAGING ADVENTURE AND MAKE TRAVEL TIME PASS QUICKLY.

### READING LABELS AND SIGNS

INVOLVE YOUR CHILDREN IN EVERYDAY READING BY ASKING THEM TO READ LABELS, SIGNS, AND MENUS. THIS NOT ONLY IMPROVES THEIR READING SKILLS BUT ALSO MAKES THEM FEEL INVOLVED IN DAILY DECISIONS

### LIBRARY VISITS

MAKE REGULAR VISITS TO YOUR LOCAL LIBRARY. LIBRARIES OFFER A WIDE RANGE OF FREE RESOURCES AND EVENTS THAT CAN INTRODUCE YOUR CHILDREN TO NEW BOOKS AND AUTHORS. IT'S ALSO A GREAT WAY TO SPEND QUALITY TIME TOGETHER.

### INCORPORATE READING INTO HOBBIES

IF YOUR CHILD ENJOYS COOKING, READ RECIPES TOGETHER. IF THEY ARE INTERESTED IN ANIMALS, FIND BOOKS ABOUT WILDLIFE. ALIGNING READING WITH THEIR INTERESTS MAKES IT MORE ENGAGING AND ENJOYABLE

### SHOPPING LIST READING

WHEN PREPARING A SHOPPING LIST, HAVE YOUR CHILD READ OUT THE ITEMS AS YOU ADD THEM TO THE BASKET. THIS IS A PRACTICAL WAY TO BUILD THEIR VOCABULARY AND MAKE THEM FEEL LIKE A HELPFUL PART OF THE FAMILY.

### CREATE A READING ROUTINE

SET ASIDE A FEW MINUTES EACH DAY FOR A FAMILY READING TIME. IT COULD BE RIGHT AFTER SCHOOL, BEFORE DINNER, OR ANY OTHER TIME THAT FITS INTO YOUR SCHEDULE. CONSISTENCY HELPS IN BUILDING A HABIT







## History at Fairholme – This Half Term

This half term, Fairholme historians have been busy travelling through time! Year 4 stepped into Roman Britain, discovering soldiers, daily life and clever inventions before creating their own vibrant mosaics. Year 3 journeyed even further back to the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age, exploring how early humans lived, hunted and built, while investigating real archaeological clues. Meanwhile, Year 1 had a roaring adventure into the world of dinosaurs, learning what they ate, how they defended themselves and how fossils reveal their ancient secrets.

## History Chat at Home – Fun Questions & Facts



Why not try some of these conversation starters at home? They link directly to the history units each year group explored this half term.

### Year 4 – *Toga-tastic!* (The Romans)

Ask your child:

- What would you pack if you were a Roman soldier heading off to a new province?
- Which Roman invention do you think was the most useful, and why?
- Can you explain what life was like in a Roman villa?

### Year 3 – *Time Team* (Stone Age to Iron Age)

Ask your child:

- How would you survive a day in the Stone Age? What would you need?
- What's the difference between the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age?
- If you were an archaeologist, which prehistoric artefact would you most like to find?

### Year 1 – *Dinosaur Roar!* (Dinosaurs)

Ask your child:

- Which dinosaur is your favourite, and what makes it special?
- Would you rather be a plant-eating dinosaur or a meat-eating one? Why?
- How do fossils help us learn about dinosaurs?

**Have fun exploring the past together – Where will your history chats take you?**





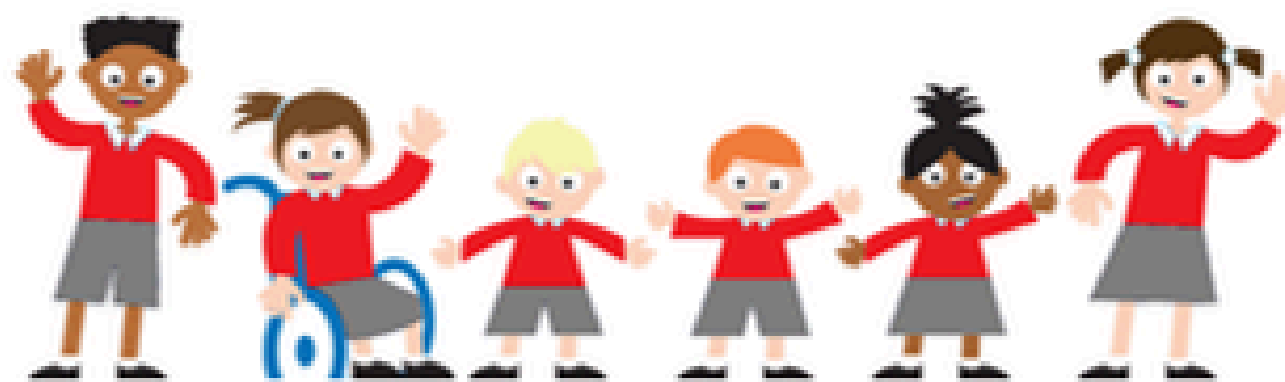

We wish all our families a wonderful Christmas and a Happy New Year!

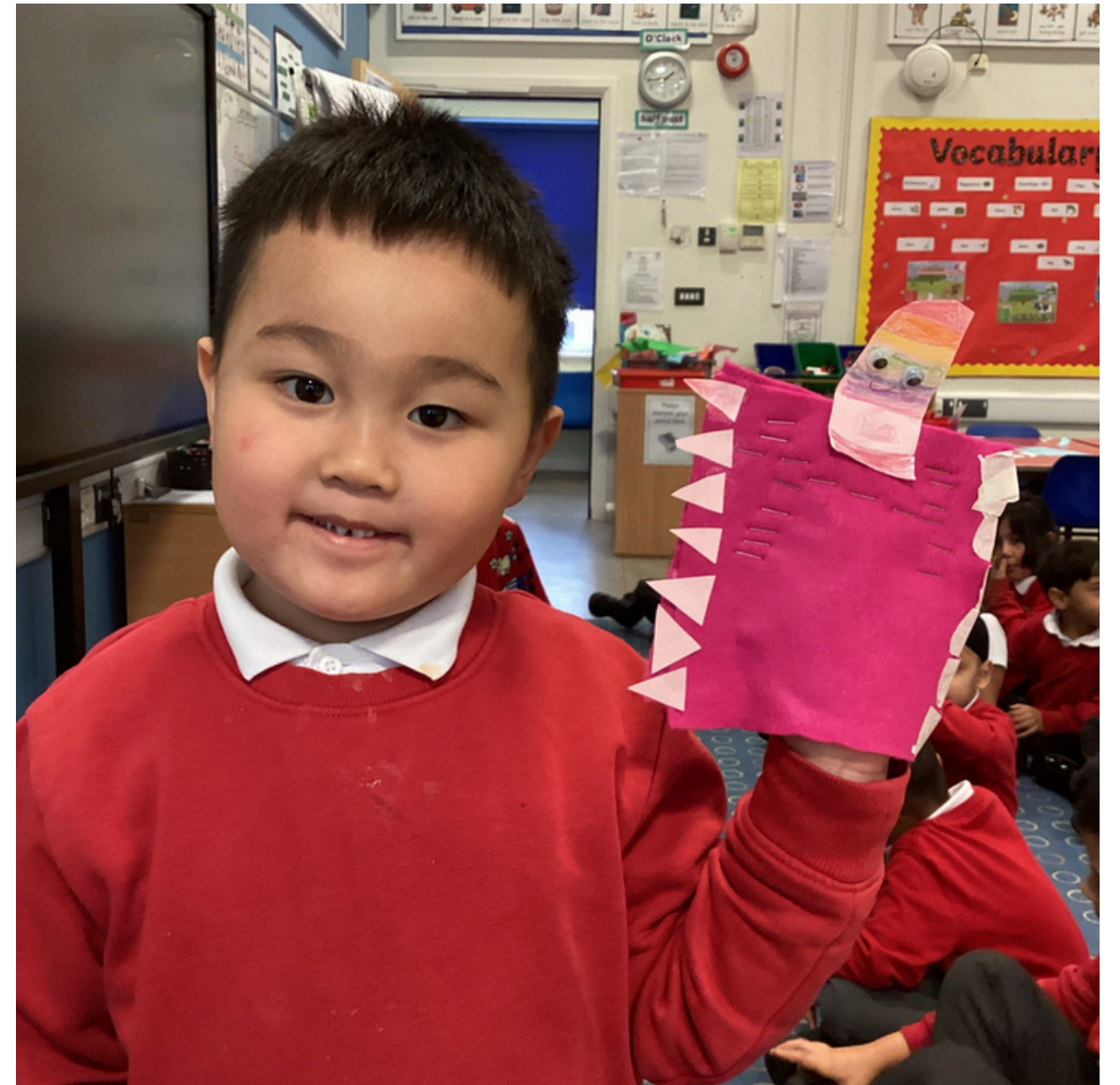






## What is happening across our school?

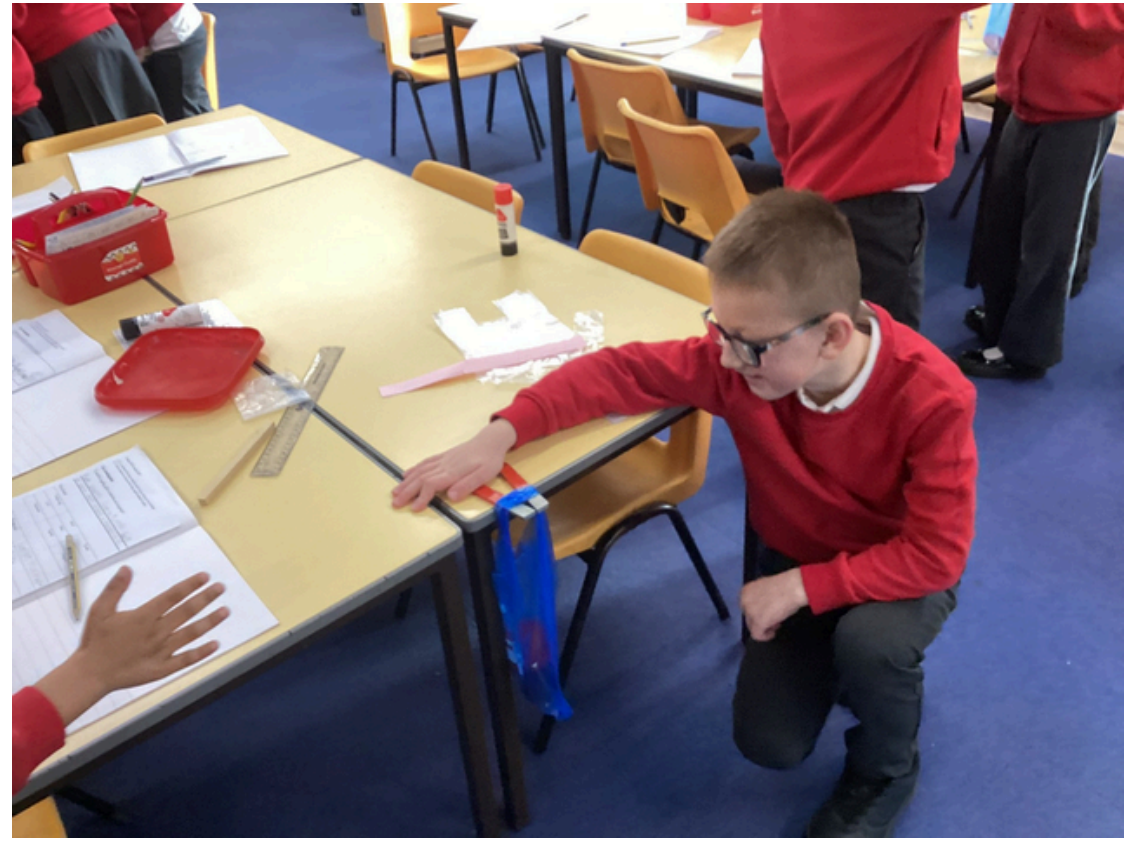






## What is happening across our school?

It has been yet another exciting half-term in Year 2! The children have settled well into all their routines and are becoming much more independent in all their learning! In Science, we have been learning how to sort and group materials based on their properties such as – strong and flexible. This allowed for some excellent discussions about the properties of a range of materials. In Maths, we have been exploring the properties of 2D and 3D shapes. We found that 3D shapes are made up of 2D shapes which was really fascinating for the children. We thank you all for your hard work with the children so far this year and look forward to seeing you in the new Year!







## What is happening across our school?

Our Year 3 “Time Team” adventurers had an absolutely amazing day at the Natural History Museum! The trip brought our science learning on rocks and fossils to life as the children explored sparkling minerals, ancient dinosaur bones, and real artefacts from the past. They were full of energy and curiosity, and asked brilliant questions throughout the day. The children could spot many links to our classroom learning. It was wonderful to see their excitement grow with every exhibit—what a fantastic way to fuel their inner scientists and historians!

Year 3’s favourite facts about the Stone Age...

The Stone Age is really long! It began about 2.6 million years ago and lasted until around 2,000 BC—so long that if you made a timeline, most of it would be Stone Age! Cavemen were amazing artists. They painted animals on cave walls using natural pigments like crushed rocks and charcoal—some of these paintings are over 30,000 years old! They didn’t have pets... until wolves became dogs. Early humans slowly befriended wolves, eventually leading to the very first domesticated dogs.



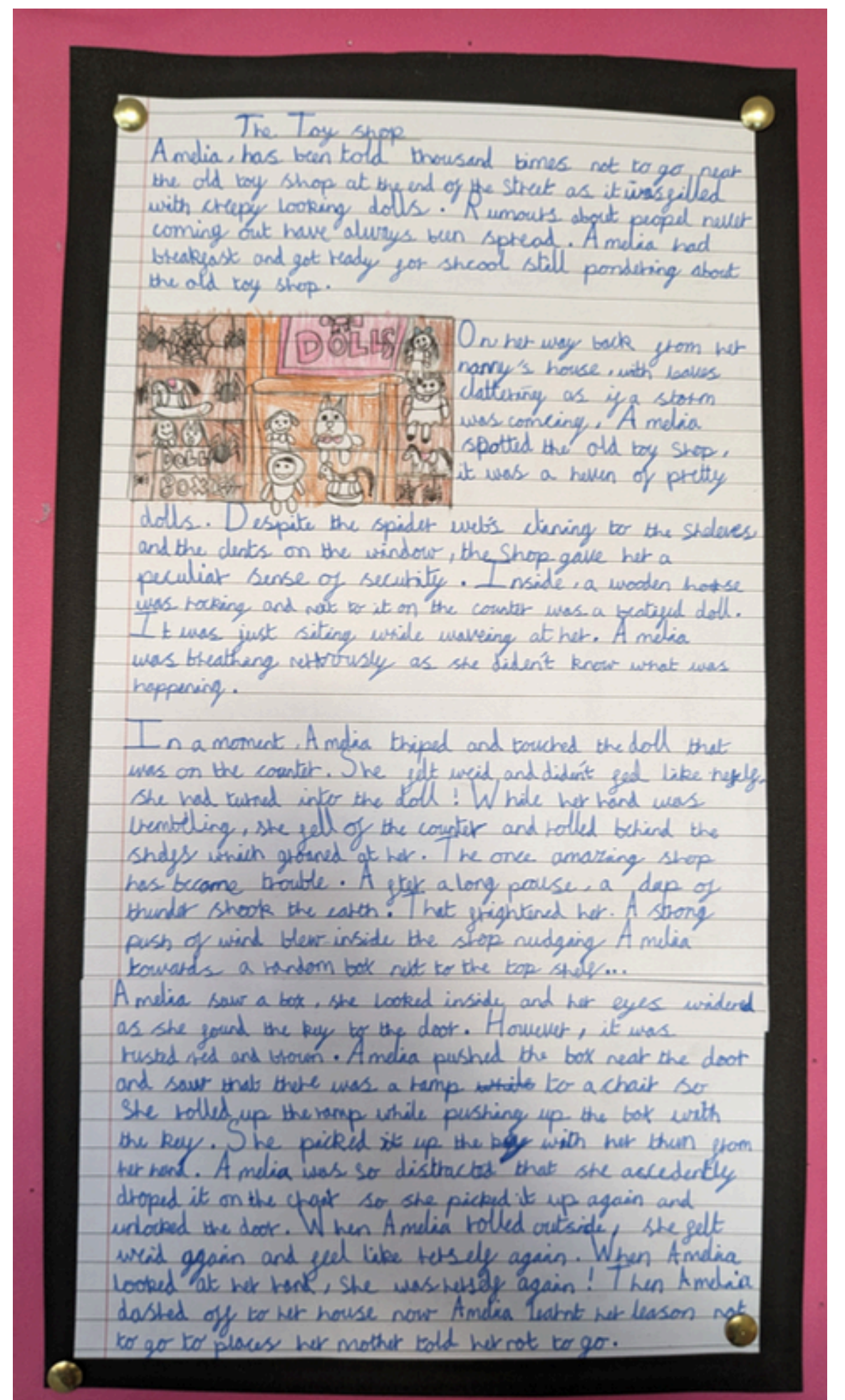
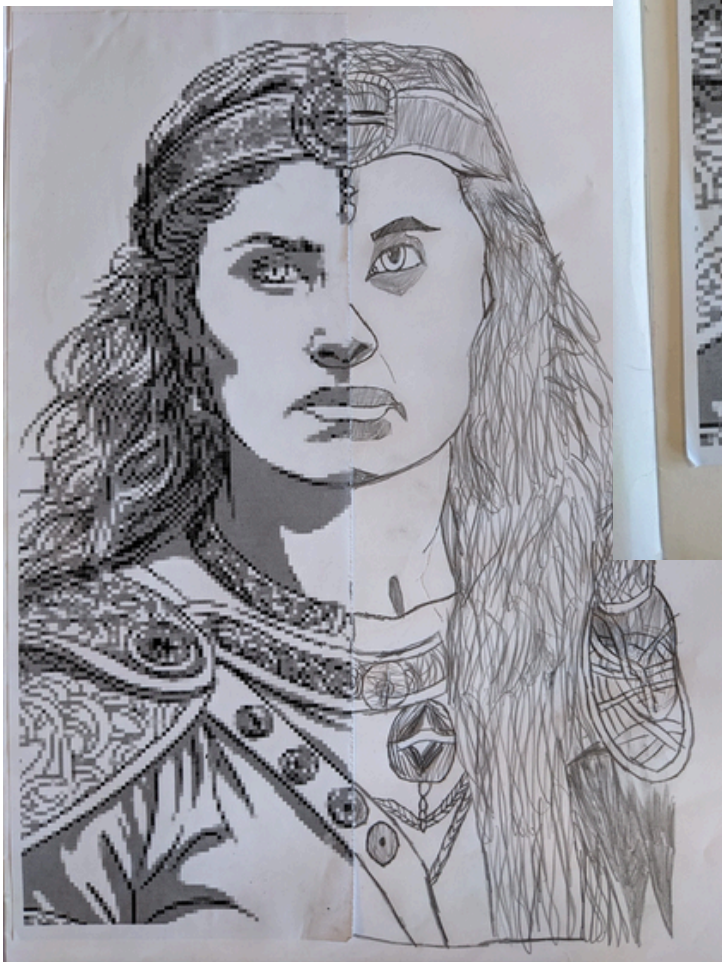
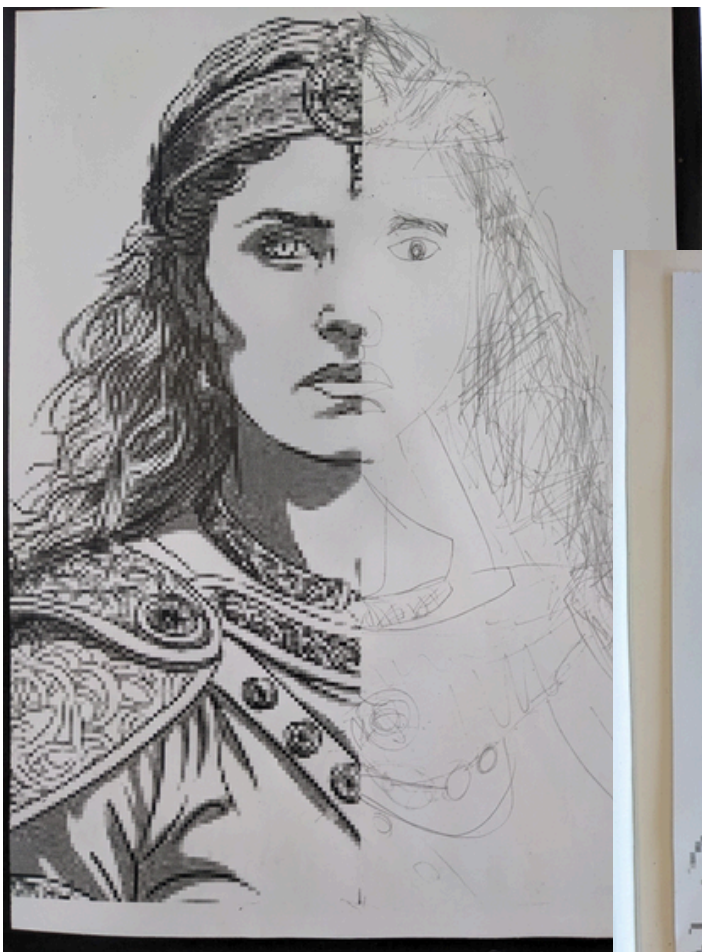




## What is happening across our school?

Year 4 have been busy crafting their suspense stories in English. We explored how writers build suspense through setting, clues and dramatic twists. The children drafted, edited and published their work, and the final pieces have been collected into a class book they are incredibly proud of. Their stories show real imagination, thoughtful word choices and growing confidence as young authors.

In History, the children have been exploring the Romans in Britain through the story of Boudica. We looked at a range of historical sources to understand how she was described and what her character might have been like. Using these clues, the class studied a half image of Boudica and completed the missing side, thinking carefully about her expression, clothing and overall presence. Their finished portraits show close observation and thoughtful interpretation of this remarkable historical figure.







## What is happening across our school?

As this brilliant term comes to an end, Year 5 has been remembering all the fun we've had and all the amazing things we've learned. Our topics—Raiders and Traders and Cosmic—took us on adventures from longboats to galaxies! We've been curious, creative, and full of questions, and now we're finishing the term with buzzing brains and big smiles.

In Maths this term, we've tackled fractions head-on and made amazing progress! We've added them, subtracted them, compared them, and simplified them like pros. We even found out how fractions sneak into everyday life, which made everything feel more real and much more fun to learn!

Writing has been a real adventure this term! We created exciting warning tales full of suspense and important messages. We also became experts at explanation texts, turning complicated ideas into clear, simple writing. And when we tackled newspaper reports, we learned how to capture the facts and tell stories like real journalists. Every piece we wrote helped us try something new—and our writing skills have gone from strong to even stronger!

In Art this term, we blasted into the world of retro futurism—a super cool style that imagines what people in the past thought the future would look like. Flying cars, neon colours, shiny robots... we explored it all! Linking this to our Cosmic topic made our creativity skyrocket, and we produced artwork that looked straight out of a vintage sci-fi adventure. It was colourful, imaginative, and completely out of this world.







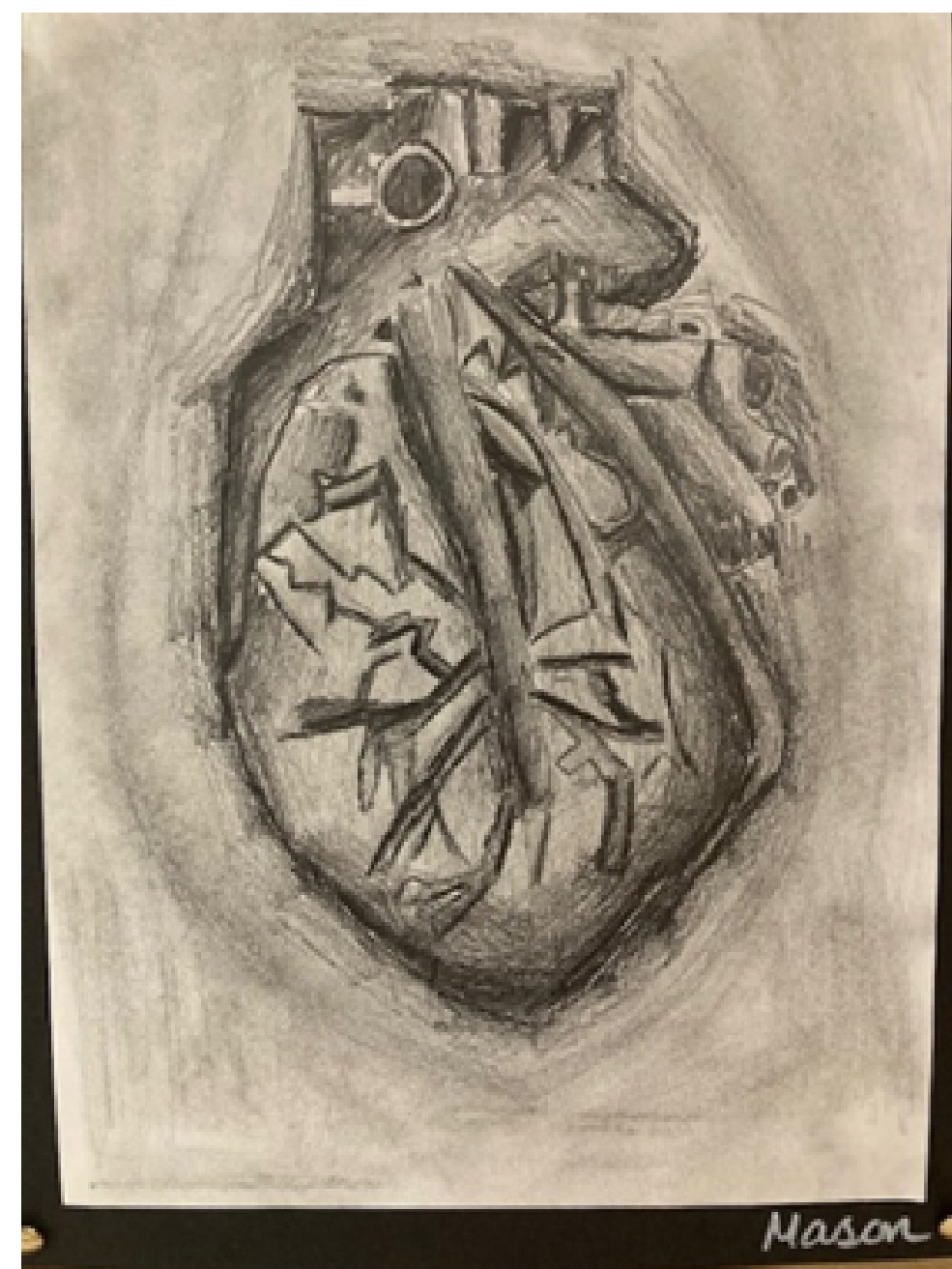
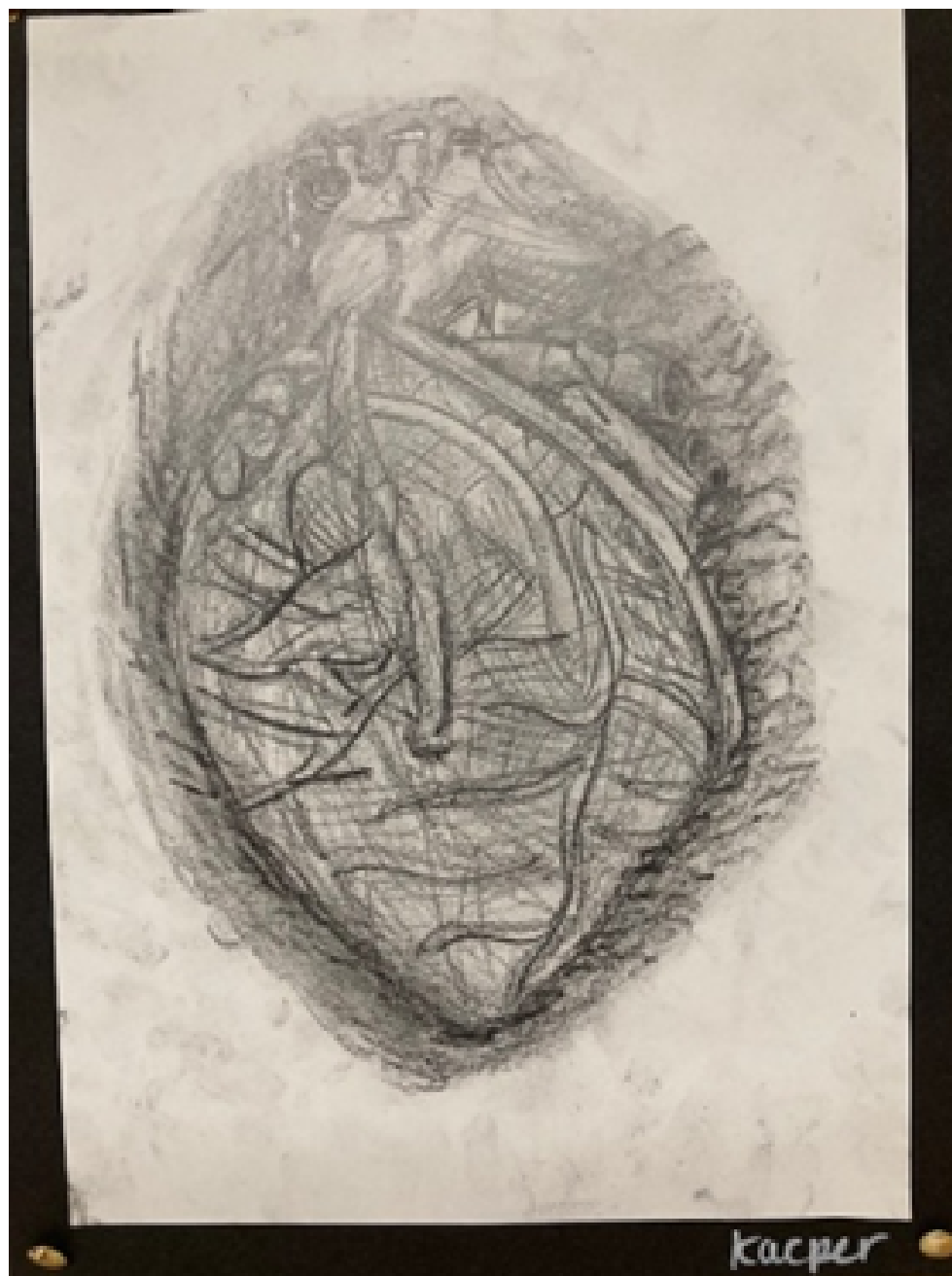
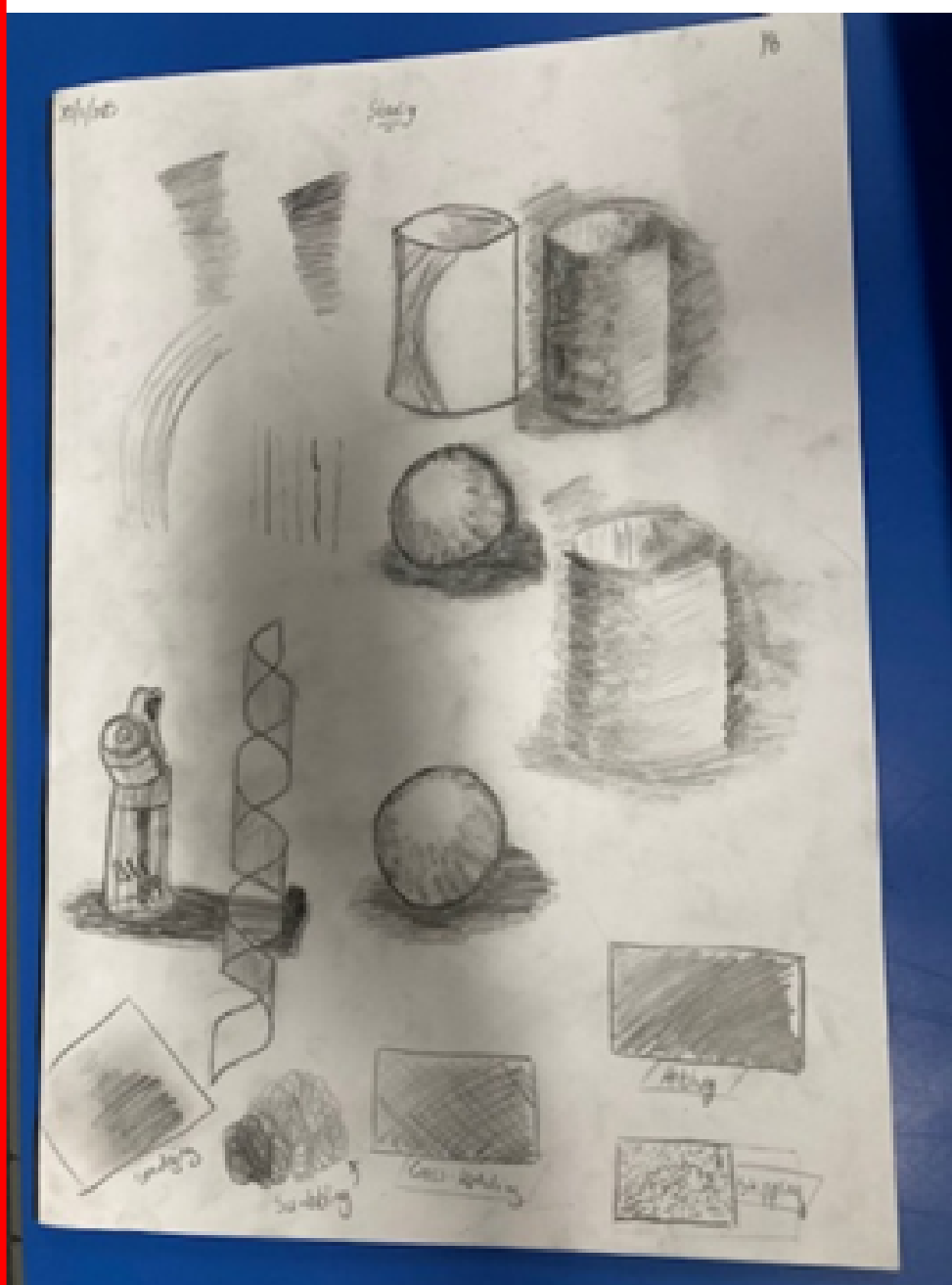
## What is happening across our school?

This half term, Year 6 have been investigating the circulatory system in their topic all about the heart. After a fascinating start to the half term, where they had the chance to dissect a lamb's heart under the guidance of 'Hands on Science', they then went onto find out about how this vital organ pumps blood around our bodies to keep us moving. The children have carried out investigations in Science to look at how exercise affects the heart and presented their results using line graphs, and have written detailed explanation texts to describe the journey of a red blood cell around the body.

In Art, the children have continued to look at the work of Leonardo Da Vinci, with a particular focus on his anatomical drawings. They have developed their sketching and shading techniques which has resulted in some incredible pencil sketches of the human heart. In English, Year 6 have written persuasive texts about how to stay healthy as well as writing their own warning stories which were full of precise description to paint a vivid picture for the reader.

Year 6 have loved Music lessons this half term where they have been learning all about rhythm and pulse through drumming and have really loved getting into the festive spirit with our singing in preparation for the Christmas concert on Monday.

We are all really looking forward to a well-deserved rest now – Happy Christmas!!

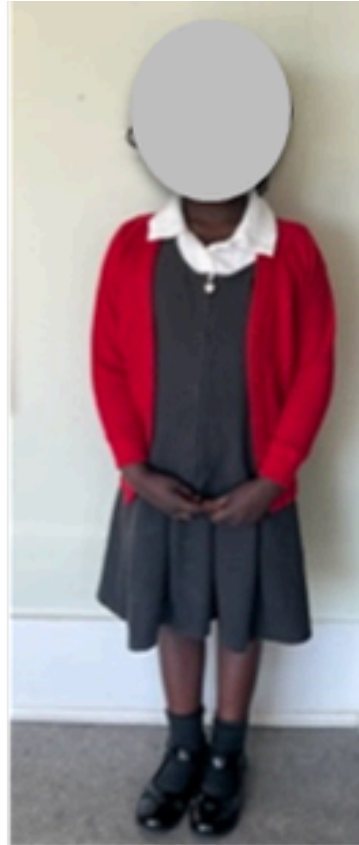




### Daily uniform list

- Plain white polo shirt with collar
- Plain red sweatshirt or cardigan, with or without the school logo (no hoods or other markings)
- Grey school trousers, shorts, skirt or pinafore dress (not sports/PE shorts)
- Red and white checked summer dress (including culottes style)
- Plain grey, white or red socks or tights
- Black shoes (not trainers or boots); in summer, smart black or white sandals may also be worn
- Simple hair accessories should be black, grey, red or white
- Plain black, grey, red or white hijabs, patkas or turbans

Nursery children are required to wear the white polo shirt and red sweatshirt or cardigan



**PE kit list** to be worn only on days when your child has PE lessons

- Plain red round-neck t-shirt (no collar or logos)
- Plain black jogging bottoms, plain black leggings or plain black loose shorts (not cycling/tight shorts)
- Plain red sweatshirt or cardigan, with or without the school logo (no hoods or other markings)
- Comfortable trainers with good grip or black plimsolls (no studs or 'heelies')
