

Next week we will be teaching the children the five PANTS rule. Talk PANTS is all about having important conversations with children to help keep them safe from sexual abuse - with the help of Pantosaurus, of course!

From P through to S, each letter of PANTS provides a simple but valuable rule.





Daily uniform list

- Plain white polo shirt with collar
- Plain red sweatshirt or cardigan, with or without the school logo (no hoods or other markings)
- Grey school trousers, shorts, skirt or pinafore dress (not sports/PE shorts)
- Red and white checked summer dress (including culottes style)
- Plain grey, white or red socks or tights
- Black shoes (not trainers or boots); in summer, smart black or white sandals may also be worn
- Simple hair accessories should be black, grey, red or white
- Plain black, grey, red or white hijabs, patkas or turbans

Nursery children are required to wear the white polo shirt and red sweatshirt or cardigan



PE kit list to be worn only on days when your child has PE lessons

- Plain red round-neck t-shirt (no collar or logos)
- Plain black jogging bottoms, plain black leggings or plain black loose shorts (not cycling/tight shorts)
- Plain red sweatshirt or cardigan, with or without the school logo (no hoods or other markings)
- Comfortable trainers with good grip or black plimsolls (no studs or 'heelies')

School shoes

All children should wear comfortable plain black school shoes. Trainers are only permitted on PE days. Some examples of suitable school shoes include:

Another day in the life of Early Years.

We have spent the last few weeks reading 'We're going on a bear hunt' by Michael Rosen. We acted out the story, Bear Hunt yoga and Reception wrote their first sentence together.


This week the Year 1 all enjoyed watching a visiting theatre company perform a **Pantomime** called **The Reluctant Dragon**.

It has been another exciting few weeks of learning in **Year 2** as last week we visited our local church. The children explored religious artefacts and showed great respect throughout the trip. In our Geography learning, we have been walking around our school and completing maps to show the borders and where our classrooms are. The children have shown great resilience at this and showed good positional language discussion such as; it must be here because the hall is next to the KS1 playground!

Our new **Year 3** topic, “**Time Team**,” is now well under way, and the children are enjoying learning and discovering a range of fascinating facts about the **Stone Age**. They are beginning to use exciting new vocabulary such as *Palaeolithic*, *Mesolithic* and *Neolithic*. The children would love to tell you all about these periods - please ask them what they have learned! This week, we have also been busy acting as detectives, observing and recording the features and properties of a range of rocks.



Did you know...

Sandstone can show beautiful layers because it forms from sand building up over time—each layer tells part of Earth’s story.

Chalk is actually made from the tiny skeletons of sea creatures that lived millions of years ago.

Granite is one of the hardest rocks on Earth and forms deep underground from slowly cooled magma—its crystals are big enough to see with the naked eye!

We can’t wait to continue exploring the wonders of the past in the weeks ahead.







What is happening across our school?

Year 4 have been **exploring Roman life and culture through a hands-on art project**. The children studied examples of ancient mosaics and then created their own designs using small tiles, patterns, and colour choices inspired by real Roman artwork. They have been proud of the detail and creativity in their finished pieces, and this project has helped them deepen their understanding of how Romans decorated their homes and public spaces.

The children also enjoyed a memorable trip to the Royal Albert Hall to see Future Makers. Experiencing live performance in such an iconic venue sparked a great deal of excitement and curiosity. Pupils returned to school talking enthusiastically about the musicians, the atmosphere, and the opportunity to see a world famous space that many of them had only heard about.







What is happening across our school?

This half term, **Year 5** have launched into our exciting new topic: **Cosmic!** This theme is all about exploring the wonders of space—how our solar system works, what lies beyond our planet, and how humans have used science, imagination, and technology to understand the universe. Throughout the unit, children will be discovering the movements of the Earth, Sun, and Moon, learning about the history of space exploration, and investigating what it might be like to travel beyond our world.

To kick-start our learning, we began with an inspiring trip to the **Science Museum**. The children were captivated by the incredible space exhibits, from rockets and satellites to real astronaut equipment. They asked brilliant questions, made thoughtful observations, and left buzzing with curiosity about the mysteries of space.

We also enjoyed a fantastic **hands-on science workshop**, where **Year 5** took part in practical investigations and launched their own rockets! The workshop was filled with excitement and offered the perfect opportunity to apply scientific thinking in a fun and memorable way.

In **art**, our creativity is truly taking off as we experiment with textures, colours, and techniques to create cosmic-themed artwork. From swirling galaxy paintings to detailed planet studies, Year 5 are producing imaginative and vibrant pieces inspired by the mysteries of outer space.

It has been an excellent start to the half term, and the children are eager to continue their cosmic adventure. We cannot wait to see where their learning takes them next!

Year 6 have had an exciting and creative term so far!

In **science**, we've been exploring the human circulatory system. The highlight was our heart dissection workshop - it was amazing to see the children so engaged, examining real hearts and asking thoughtful questions. Clearly, we have some budding scientists and doctors in the making!


In **art**, the children have been studying the life and methods of Leonardo da Vinci. They have explored his sketches, techniques, and inventive approach to combining art and science. Now they are putting their skills to the test by recreating his famous Da Vinci Heart sketch, carefully observing details and bringing their own creativity to the work.

In **computing**, we've been focusing on staying safe online. The children have explored topics such as cyberbullying, the impact of social media on wellbeing and self-image, and how to use technology safely, respectfully, and responsibly. It's been fantastic to see them thinking critically about their online behaviour and discussing ways to protect themselves and others.

In **reading**, we have begun our adventure into the world of Alex Rider with *Stormbreaker* by Anthony Horowitz. The children are already hooked by the action, suspense, and clever twists, and it's been wonderful to see them discussing characters and predicting what might happen next.

The festive spirit is also alive and well in Year 6, as the corridors fill with the sound of rehearsals for our **Christmas Carol concert**. It's been lovely to see the children working together, practicing with enthusiasm, and embracing the joy of the season.

With such a busy term so far, we're proud of the children's curiosity, creativity, teamwork, and thoughtfulness.
