
Roman Day at Conkers


17th December 2019

Year 3 Forces workshop 'Think Tank'

To develop our forces knowledge and skills, Jenny from Think Tank came into school. We learnt to;

- Compare how things move on different surfaces
- Notice that some forces need contact between 2 objects, but magnetic forces can act at a distance
- Observe how magnets attract or repel each other and attract some materials and not others
- Compare and group together a variety of everyday materials on the basis of whether they are attracted to a magnet, and identify some magnetic materials
- Describe magnets as having 2 poles
- Predict whether 2 magnets will attract or repel each other, depending on which poles are facing.

To develop our dance skills in year 3, we invited Dani from Kick Start Academy into school. We worked really hard as a team, had great fun and produced a super dance routine!






Toscana String Concert

'Bee' kind to bees!

Recently, the Key worker plus children have been learning about wildlife and habitats and how we can encourage more wildlife into our gardens. We learned about bees and how they have lost most of their habitat. Some children made a bee hotel for solitary bees.

Why build a bee hotel?

Our bees are facing an unprecedented crisis. They've lost much of their natural habitat in the past 60 years – including 97% of wildflower-rich meadows. And they're under assault from pesticides, intensive farming and climate change. But by creating beefriendly spaces where we live, we can start to replace and restore some of this lost habitat and help Britain bloom for bees.










How could you encourage more wildlife to your garden?

- Plant more flowers and flowering trees and plants to encourage more pollinators. When selecting flowering plants, try to choose single petalled varieties.
- Feed the birds with sunflowers seeds, nuts and fat balls in winter.
- Create a pond area or water feature to encourage all kinds of wildlife, to drink from, bathe in and live in.
- Put up bat boxes and bird boxes in safe places for nesting.
- Create bua hotels.














