




Key Vocabulary	
Transparent	Allowing light to pass through so that objects behind can be distinctly seen.
Translucent	Allowing light, but not detailed shapes, to pass through; semi-transparent.
Opaque	Not able to be seen through; not transparent.
Transmit	Cause (something) to pass on from one person or place to another.
Reflect	(Of a surface or body) throw back (heat, light, or sound) without absorbing it.
Absorb	Take in or soak up (energy or a liquid or other substance) by chemical or physical action.

Hieroglyphics are a writing system that use pictures and symbols instead of letters and words.

The word hieroglyph **means** “holy carving.” The Egyptians used **hieroglyphs** on their temple walls and public monuments.

Key Vocabulary	
Ancient Civilisation:	The first settled and stable communities that became the basis for later states, nations, and empires.
Reign:	Hold royal office; rule as monarch.
Equator:	A line notionally drawn on the earth equidistant from the poles, dividing the earth into northern and southern hemispheres
Topography:	The arrangement of the natural and artificial physical features of an area.
Pharaoh:	A ruler in ancient Egypt.
Tomb:	A large vault, typically an underground one, for burying the dead.
Sarcophagus:	A stone coffin, typically adorned with a sculpture or inscription and associated with the ancient civilizations of Egypt
