Response to Feedback:

Communication with parents

Parents like the platform we use – Class Dojo and feel this has improved communication. They also like the weekly newsletters and feel that in general they are well informed about what is going on in school. Parents like our Facebook page.

Improvements:

- There are too many posts on Class Dojo
- Posts can be missed especially
- Consider best times to send out posts
- Avoid sudden changes/cancellations
- Paper copies of newsletter

HT's Response:

Class Dojo has grown and we are now able to use it more effectively as a communication tool. As well as classes, we can set up different groups for quick and easy communication to specific parents.

Staff have been asked to think about timings of posts (ideally at the end of the school day) although this is not always possible.

Sometimes there will be a high volume of posts e.g. now in the run up to Christmas, we have so many events that it is inevitable that there will be a higher number of posts.

We appreciate that posts can be missed – this is the same as any form of communication – letters can be lost and emails can be missed. If parents get into the habit of checking Class Dojo a couple of times during the day, this should be avoided.

Where possible, we try to think and plan ahead to give plenty of notice. Unfortunately, sometimes there are short notice cancellations due to illness or bad weather which are unavoidable.

As a school we are trying to be more eco-friendly and reduce our carbon footprint. For this reason, we are not going to go back to sending out paper copies of the newsletter but we will send out paper copies of important letters, especially if they have slips for parents to sign.

Reporting on Pupil Progress

Parents were pleased with the Zoom Parents' Evenings during lockdowns and also appreciated regular phone calls from class teachers.

Improvements:

More feedback required on individual pupil progress and attainment through the year

 Better communication with parents when pupils are struggling with areas of their learning

HT's Response

I fully recognise that this is an area that needs improving. The second lockdown in the spring term made reporting on progress and attainment very difficult as we didn't assess pupils until the summer term.

We will continue to have two Parents' Evenings in the year – being able to use Zoom and phone calls has helped teachers to connect with more parents.

Each half-term, pupils will bring home an evaluation of learning sheet where they will evaluate how they feel about their learning and the teacher will add targets for the next term.

At the end of the autumn and spring terms, pupils will have a short report on attainment and progress which will show parents which areas they are on track in and where they are behind age related expectations.

In the summer term, pupils will receive a full detailed report which from summer 2022 will also include any statutory data.

In addition, teachers will send home a letter to inform parents of any intervention groups children are attending. These run for 15 weeks after which there will be a short progress update. Next due – last week in January.

Teachers are encouraged to meet with parents if they feel a child has a barrier to learning which could potentially be a form of special educational need, to discuss steps forward. When pupils are assessed for SEN, parents will be informed of the findings and if a child is placed on the SEN register, the parent will be invited into school each term to talk through the Individual Progress Plan that has been set and also to review progress towards previous targets.

Assessment of pupils is an on-going process and is built into lessons. Key assessment points for more formal assessment are end of autumn and spring term, May for Year 2 and Year 6 SATS and end of June for all other year groups.

Statutory testing also includes baseline assessment at the start of Reception, Year 1 phonics in June, (current Year 2 will do this in December) and the new Year 4 Multiplication test.

3. Range of Extra-Curricular Activities

Many parents said that we have a wide range of clubs and activities available and are very happy with what is on offer. Some parents said there needed to be more variety for different age groups.

Improvements:

- More sports wider variety (heavy focus on dance)
- Something to meet interests of all pupils

HT's Response

For a relatively small school, I think we offer an extensive range of extra-curricular opportunities.

Last year: football, tennis, archery, forest, gardening, dance, science, art, board games, cooking, samba (probably more!)

The problem last year was that due to bubbles, clubs had to be offered to classes so it meant only 1 class was offered each activity.

We use some of our Sports Premium Funding to buy in services from Fleetwood Town. They provide a wide range of sports activities and clubs for our pupils. Last year, this was limited due to not being able to have visitors in school.

We are also relying on staff volunteering to run clubs.

The Laura Sandham School of Dance use our school as a satellite centre so although it looks like we offer a lot of dance, these are not actually our clubs but additional opportunities for our pupils.

In the spring, we will be offering both netball and football and there will be more sports activities bought in from Fleetwood Town. We request clubs but it depends on the availability of the coaches. Sometimes instead of an extra-curricular club, we choose for the whole class to experience a sport in PE – Year 5 and 6 have had Quidditch and Basketball this term.

Through the year, there will be a range of clubs offered – the aim is to try to find something for everyone. We currently have a chess club which is very popular and many children are part of the choir.

After Christmas, I will meet with the School Council to get ideas of the types of clubs they would like us to run.

Other Points:

More eco work – encouraging pupils to be environmentally friendly

Mrs Oxley has just set up an Eco-Warriors group who will be working on reducing our carbon footprint and engaging the school in some environmentally friendly projects. This is something that we are passionate about and it links to our Christian ethos of caring for God's world.

· More support for mental health and well-being

This year, Mrs Potter has an almost full-time role as SENCO/Learning Mentor so that we can support pupils' mental health needs more effectively and also offer support to parents. We are also developing strong links with outside agencies to enable us to be able to signpost parents in the right direction for support.

Later After-School Club

This is in place. Pupils can attend after-school club until 5:30 or 6:00 pm if required.

More monitoring at playtimes

Pupils are now split at playtimes so they are not all outside at once apart from the 10 minute afternoon break. There are 3 adults outside on each break – previously we have had two.

More fruit available at lunch time

There is always fruit available for pupils on school lunches. Our Reception and KS1 pupils get free fruit each day and pupils are encouraged to bring fruit for a snack at break times.

Wearing PE kit on PE day

We recognised this as being a positive from last year and so have kept it in place. We have introduced our PE hoodies and specific requirements so that pupils look smart in their PE kits.
