## School Attendance and Law

Children registered at school must attend regularly and punctually. As their parent or carer, you have a legal responsibility to ensure they do. Failure to do so may result in legal action being taken. Upon conviction, the maximum fine could be $£ 2,500$ and/or up to three months imprisonment.

## Attendance Matters



Our three core values are character, resilience and aspiration. Children who attend school regularly will achieve their full potential. Not only does school provide high quality learning experiences to enrich children's lives, but we also provide numerous opportunities for children to develop social skills and to grow into well-rounded individuals. Good attendance means children will benefit greatly from these aspects of school life and it will help to them to develop their character, build their resilience and enhance their aspirations.

To avoid disrupting your child's education, you should arrange appointments and outings:

- after school hours
- at weekends
- during school holidays
- You should not expect Fortis Academy to authorise absences for a holiday during term time.
- not letting your child take time off school for minor ailments

There are 175 days per year which are nonschool days for other activities such as holidays and days out.

## Your Child's Education is Important.

- Research shows students with less than $90 \%$ attendance do dramatically less well in public examinations.
- Employers will want to be sure that the people they recruit are reliable. Children who have a poor school attendance record have less chance of getting a job.
- Young people who are off school for no good reason are at risk of becoming victims of crime or abuse. They may also be drawn into antisocial behaviour.


## Is 90\% Attendance Really Good Enough?

Students with $\mathbf{9 0 \%}$ attendance miss:

- 4 whole weeks of lessons each year
- half a year of their secondary education
Those students with attendance $\mathbf{9 0} \mathbf{- 9 4 \%}$ achieve up to a third of a grade higher in all GCSEs than those with attendance below $\mathbf{9 0 \%}$ and those with attendance higher than $94 \%$ achieve over half a grade higher for every GCSE.
