Dear Parents, Carers and Families,

This week in school we've been focused in assemblies on Remembrance, culminating in services for Years 7 to 10 today with Reverend Joanne Thorns to which 6th Form students were also invited to attend. Along with much of the nation, we'll also observe a period of silence next Monday as we remember those people who paid the ultimate sacrifice for our democratic way of life and indeed all those people across the world impacted by war.

In assemblies we spoke specifically about the how humanity is unique in that as a species we're the only one on this planet that speaks to wage war but that also we're the only one that can create true art. The Christmas Day truce in 1914 when soldiers met in No Man's Land to play football, swap cigarettes and spend time in each other's company is a fairly well known story but it was singing in the trenches on Christmas Eve that first helped break down the barriers of conflict, British soldiers singing the hymn 'Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken', not knowing that the tune was the same as the German national anthem and then hearing 'Stille Nacht' or 'Silent Night' in return. Sometimes when we talk about "art" with students they instinctively see it as an abstract thing only to be found in galleries in London they don't go to, but in truth it surrounds us all, enriching our lives instead of damaging them or taking them away like war. The sculptor Henry Moore said, "To be an artist is to believe in life" and I would hope all our students choose art, not war.

Fortunately for many of our students armed conflict is an abstract thing that happens somewhere far away but there are members of our community here who have faced the reality of war and indeed are here as a direct result of conflict. As a School of Sanctuary, we are proud to welcome those seeking safety, to offer them a sense of belonging to our community and give them opportunities to thrive and succeed. This is not only without doubt ethically the right thing to do but also fits with our core values of compassion and respect for all. Of course, it would be a better world if there was no need for us to do this but we're proud to not only offer this help but to inculcate and foster in all our students the belief that true strength is to be found in helping those that need the most. I'm not personally a religious man but I do have a copy of the New Testament and Psalms on my desk here in school, a gift from a close friend who saw active service in Afghanistan and gave me his military issue book upon his return. It includes a 'Paratrooper's Prayer Card' that ends with the sentence, 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest.' I'm proud that we as a school are able to offer just that to those who need it most.

Ofsted

On Saturday 19th October, 12 of our students from Years 9 and 10 competed at the Royal Grammar School against schools from as far afield as London, Birmingham and Blackpool in the first VEX robotics tournament of the new High Stakes season. Key Year 11 Information – Mock Exams Week Beginning 18th November

We hope your child had a restful break over half term but also dedicated some time to their mock preparation, as was discussed with both you and your child in last half terms progress meetings.

We'd like to congratulate Year 11 students on their hard work and dedication to RAS. They have now completed 5 weeks of RAS and next week signifies the last RAS week in this block.
