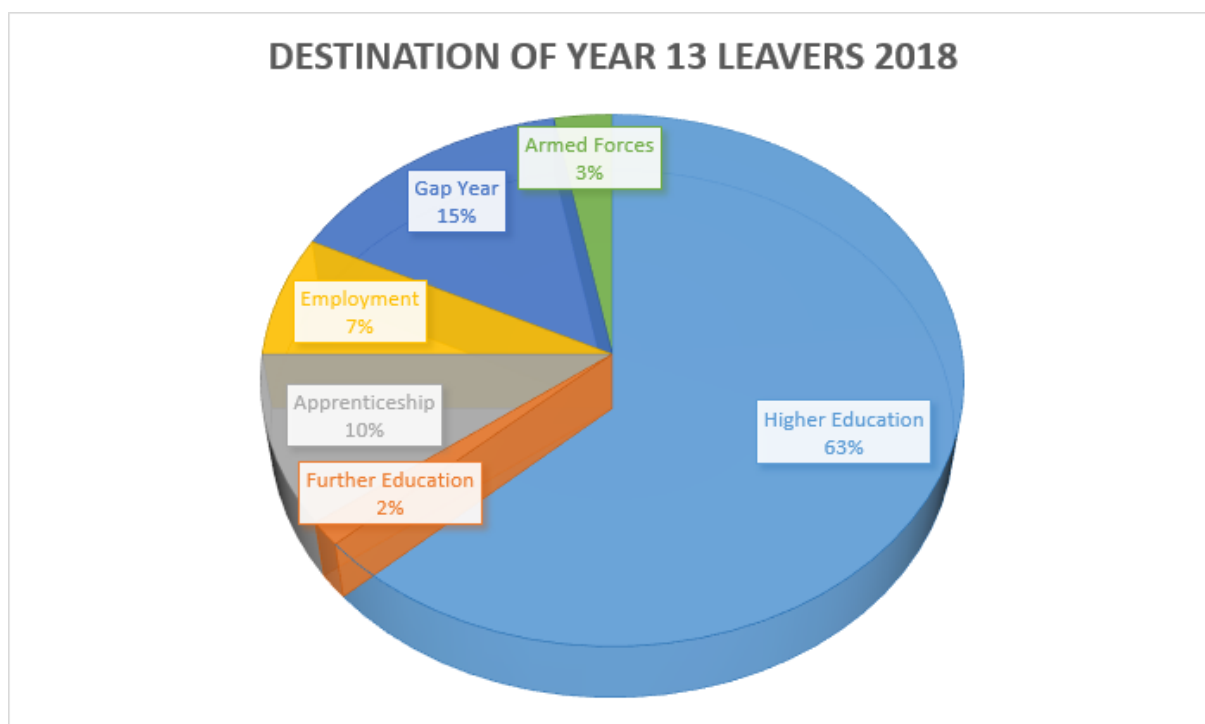


Year 13 Leavers Destination Report 2018

69* students enrolled into Year 13 in September 2017, 68 completed courses in the summer of 2018.

1 student left at the beginning of February 2018 to pursue a course at college.

*72 students were on roll officially in Year 13, but 3 were taught in Year 12 after re-starting Level 3 courses.



Progression to Higher Education

47 students applied through UCAS for Higher Education courses.

1 student applied to university in Japan.

- Four withdrew from the process prior to results day to re-consider their course choices. One progressed on to an Art Foundation course. Three applied and were successful in gaining university places the following year (one following a Year in Industry).

43 students remained in the process:

- 34 students (79%) were accepted onto their first choice course. 2 of these students chose not to take up their place and instead accepted offers of higher apprenticeships.
- 6 students were accepted onto their second choice course.
- 3 students were made an alternative offer by their first or second choice university and progressed onto foundation years.

Of the 41 students progressing onto Higher Education in the UK:

- **23 students were accepted to Russell Group Universities (55%)**
- 18 students progressed onto STEM courses.
- 11 students progressed onto social science, arts and humanities courses.
- 4 students progressed onto business and related courses.

- 3 students progressed onto health care courses (2 nursing & 1 dentistry).
- 3 students progressed onto sport and sport related courses.
- 1 student progressed onto law.
- 1 student progressed onto an education course leading to QTS.

Progression to other destinations

7 students planned to take a gap year from early in Year 13, in addition to the 3 that decided to withdraw from the UCAS process, meaning a total of **10 students took a planned gap year** in 2018/19. Activities undertaken during the gap year included:

- A Year in Industry placement arranged through the Engineering Development Trust.
- Volunteer and paid work experience related to teaching and health care.
- International travel.
- Paid work.

Following their gap year student destinations were as follows:

- 4 started university in 2019.
- 2 started university in 2020.
- 2 enrolled on further education courses at local colleges.
- 2 were employed.

2 students were going through the recruitment process for the Armed Forces on leaving school in 2018 – one for the RAF and one for the Army.

14 students entered employment or took up apprenticeships on leaving school in 2018 (including the two who turned down university places), this included:

- Level 3 apprenticeships with the National Audit Office and for local companies in business admin, IT and childcare.
- Full and part time employment in local retail, sport and leisure, hospitality and utilities.
