Year 3 News

Our Year 3 children have certainly been having a busy and interesting term!



In Maths this term, Year 3 have been using practical resources to help them develop a deeper understanding of their maths topics. We use place value counters, hundred squares, Deinnes apparatus and number

lines as well as drawing pictures and symbols to model our mathematical thinking. We love playing maths games that really get us thinking and applying our mathematical skills



in different ways. We have covered some tricky topics this term including time and fractions.

Everyone is working hard to get their times table award and a special mention should be

given to the children who have received their gold or platinum award already (pictured below left)

Our year 3 children are passionate about learning French. Our aim this term has been to develop



confidence so that we are not afraid to take chances and this will inspire everyone to want to learn more. We have started to learn greetings such as 'Bonsoir' and how to ask questions about each other such as someone's name or how they are feeling. We have ended the term learning our French numbers to 10. Year 3 love role play in French lessons and it's always fun to be picked to act out a French scene on the streets of Paris!

Year 4 get all scientific.....!

We have been celebrating STEM week across the school (Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics) and have linked our Year group studies to our whole school project **'Other Worlds'**. The main school theme was 'Our Future World' and each year group studied a linked topic.

Year 4's topic was 'Our Future Health' and we began by learning about the human digestive system. We carried out an investigation to try and reproduce what happens to food in our mouth, stomach and intestines by using paper towels, sandwich bags and tights! It was such good fun, and informative, that we repeated the task with Year 2 when they visited us from Fulwell Infants. The Year 4's were amazing teachers and helped the Year 2's really understand what happens to food as it travels through our bodies!



Did you know?

Class 5 were visited by a STEM ambassador who told us all about Tim Peake and how Space Stations are designed and we got to design and make our own model spacestations.





We have also enjoyed a visit to St Peter's Church as part of our RE and Geography studies. We were joined by quite a few helpers (thanks to those who walked with us and helped on the day) and learned a lot about the church, the area and the importance of the building to the community, past and present.







Our Rights Respecting Journey.....

The Rights Respecting Schools accreditation was borne out of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child. There are four underpinning principles:-

- 1. Non-discrimination ~ treat everyone fairly and with respect;
- 2. Right to life, survival & development ~ children and youth have a right to the basic things to live, survive & develop;
- 3. Best interests of children & youth ~ always ask yourself 'is the decision I'm making good for kids?';
- 4. Respect the views of children & youth ~ children & youth need to participate and have their views considered when decisions are being made that affect them.

A SUMMARY OF THE UN CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD

UNICEF is the world's leading organisation working with children and their rights. It was founded by the United Nations in 1946 in a response to the post war devastation in 1953 the Europe. In UN children's fund was made permanent and it now leads the way in global citizenship for children.

What makes 'rights' different?

- Rights are based on entitlement
- They are enshrined in international law
- They require participation and engagement.

Rights have involvement—Needs don't! It is important young people have a voice. A Rights Respecting School will acknowledge this.

Our Rights Respecting achievements so far......

- We have already achieved our Recognition of Commitment level by setting up a Steering Group, carrying out an audit and producing an action plan.
- The Steering Group includes Mr Speck, Mrs Avery, Mrs Bankhead, Miss Birch, Mrs Pearson and Mrs Anderson (Governor link).
- Rights Respecting will be embedded in all school practice—it will encourage children and staff to think about actions that operate in the best interests of the child—that is the top priority.



The next step towards our accreditation will take place in October when we will be subject to an RR inspection, evaluating the impact of the agenda in school and how effectively we are progressing on our journey.

THE CONVENTION ARTICLES......

There are 54 Articles in the Convention, 45 of which relate to the rights of the child. We have selected 12 of the Articles for every Class to adopt as their individual 'Right'.

In addition, children and staff have been challenged to learn, by heart, at least one 'right' before the end of term. We have suggested we all learn our birthday right, and focus on the Article linked to the date when we were born. Parents, you can help too by learning your child's right with them.

The Summary Statements will be on display around school—why not check your child's class 'right' and learn a little more about it?

Giving our children a 'Boost'

To assist with the SATS preparations we are running Booster classes during the Easter holidays on Tuesday 18th and Wednesday 19th April (10.00am-2.30pm) for our Year 6 children. Don't Stress ~ Try Your Best!



Some children get very anxious about sitting the tests. Parents can work with us by supporting these simple principles:

- ⇒ Make sure your child gets a good nights sleep before the exam and a decent breakfast before coming to school.
- ⇒ Give positive encouragement, don't put too much pressure on them.
- ⇒ Continue to encourage the completion of homework and regular attendance at their support classes where appropriate.
- ⇒ Make use of the websites we use in school to support home learning.

The Art of Monozukuri.....

In February, Year 6 were invited by Nissan to visit their Sunderland branch to find out about their history and cars.

During the morning, we learned about Nissan's history and then created our own production line. In the afternoon, we got a chance to see the Nissan production line in operation, where people practice their manufacturing skills. We even practiced some skills ourselves!





The most interesting part was learning about a tradition Nissan have in ensuring all their processes follow the principles of 'Monozukuri' - this is a Japanese term for the art of manufacturing where 'Mono' relates to the thing that is made and 'Zukuri' relates to

the act of making. The nearest translation in English would be 'craftsmanship'. At Nissan , the emphasis is very much on the pursuit of excellence where all the principles work in harmony with each other.

Another tradition of 'Monozukuri' is the creation of a Japanese dolls head at the beginning of every new project—when the project starts, one eye of the doll is coloured in, and the second eye is coloured in when the project is finished. This is seen to be a sign of good luck. On our visit, we were enough lucky to be presented with a dolls head, which we all signed as a memento of our great team work.



Overall, Year 6 loved this trip and found out some very interesting things about Nissan and about working at Nissan.
