This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Swimming Data

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

Question	Stats:	Further context Relative to local challenges
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	68%	Children completed swimming lessons all year - most children able to swim 10m/20m quite early on in year and 68% progressed to 25m or 50m.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	76%	Front crawl was the strongest stroke. Breast stroke was weakest strong but 76% of children confident with all.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	53%	All children able to complete Water Safety Intro. 53% then able to progress due to many children unable to tread water/hold floating position when completing water safety.

Have you done this?	Yes/ <mark>No</mark>	Due to size of group – this was not doable for the current year 6 class. The cohort of children for 23/24 academic year have a very low success percentage and therefore needed more time within the shallow end of the swimming pool which would mean no space for year 6 top-up sessions.
Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	Yes/No	PE Lead (current year 4 teacher) and teaching assistant who will both accompany year 4 class on their swimming lessons took part in a full day Swimming in School CPD session. This included going through the theory side of swimming in the curriculum and why it is important. It also included a practical where members of staff led a swimming session for a class of children who were split into groups.
