

Meet our Interim Headteacher



Sean Bullen is the interim Headteacher for Garstang Community Academy until Christmas. Mr. Bullen stepped in surprisingly quickly after Alastair Ashcroft's resignation as Headteacher. Bullen came all the way from FCAT to help the school get back on its concrete feet. He has been with FCAT for nearly over six years. Whilst Headteacher at Millfield, Mr Bullen took Millfield from an Ofsted 'Inadequate' to 'Good' Leadership was judged as Outstanding. Millfield were National Pupil Premium award winners in 2014, winning out of 3400 secondary schools. Bullen also won the first Fylde Coast Headteacher of the year in 2015.

In terms of his career Mr Bullen has spent 6 years at Hodgson High School as an English teacher, Head of Drama, Head of Year from 1990-1996. 4 years at Carr Hill High School as a Head of Art and P.E from 1996-2000. 4 years at St George's C of E High School, Blackpool as a Deputy Head from 2000-2004. 2 years at LSAHTC, Lytham as a Deputy Head from 2004-2006. 12 years at Millfield SPAC as Head Teacher from 2006-2018. 2 years at Millfield SPAC as Executive

1 How are you enjoying your stay at Garstang Community Academy?

Mr Bullen's response was that he is loving his time here as he drives to school in the radiant rising sun and drives home in the shining setting sun to Blackpool.

Students will receive certificates as evidence of having participated in the work experience programme. Those that complete the full 5-month programme will also be awarded Highly Commended References.





Sports News - First Boccia competition at Garstang

No-one would have predicted this ten years ago - our first accessible sports day - that day came around last July!



On the morning of a bright and sunny Thursday in July, our school Sports Day started off with the first Accessible sport in the school's history. Boccia is a Paralympic sport very similar to French Boules. It is a sport that is accessible for all people and it's for all ages. On this, its first year, they introduced the sport to the Year 9's only because two of it's pupils use wheelchairs and would not be able to access any other aspect of the sports day.



A maximum of 4 people could take part for their form. On the morning of the competition there was anticipation in the air. Many pupils didn't know how to play, but there were a handful of Sports Studies students who had some experience and Mrs Rainbow and Mrs Parkinson helped everyone understand the game. The competitive nature of the children soon revealed itself and scores kept coming in. It was a very close competition with 9.3 scraping through with enough points to win.
