History Detectives

This term, to support the children's understanding of the concept chronology in History, the children became History detectives.



In the first few weeks, the children received artefacts in a bag. These were delivered to classrooms without any clues as to who they belonged to or what period of History they represented. The children worked



hard to use their prior knowledge to identify, 'who' did the objects belong to, 'what' period of History does it represent, 'how' does this period of History compare to today and 'what' legacy was left behind.

As a result of the children's great detective work, each year group put together a board to display this knowledge. This now forms the basis of our History chronology line displayed in the hall. As different periods of History are studied, classes refer to this or add to this in different ways, a good example being the reflections done during Remembrance Day.

We built an understanding of how it is important to be unique and special, celebrating our differences together. Taking advantage of our brilliant local community and environment, the children have learnt about our Gatley community, considering the places and people they might find and the important role that they each play. We have been lucky to welcome so many visitors, including a dentist and a member of the local Islamic centre, as well as being able to venture out into the local community to Gatley Carrs, Elm Road URC halls and St James' Church.



Rounding off the term with a bang, we put together a spectacular performance of 'How the Grinch Made New Friends', accumulating all that we have learnt about ourselves, our friends and our journey so far at Gatley Primary. We are immensely proud of all that the children have achieved and cannot wait to see them shine in the New Year.





What Makes Britain Great?

This term, Year 1 have been exploring the question 'What Makes Britain Great?'

We started the year by learning all about The Great Fire of London. We learnt all about Samuel Pepys and his secret diary, and even sang the song 'London's Burning'.

Through our Geography sessions, we learnt about the four countries in the United Kingdom and their capital cities, whilst finding out about what physical and human features were in each country. We then used our understanding of the countries and our new knowledge of materials to support our creation of some amazing landmark structures as part of our DT project. We loved designing and making Tower Bridge, Buckingham Palace, Edinburgh Castle, The Titanic Museum and the Principality Stadium.

We wanted to find out if all countries are the same, so we compared the countries in the United Kingdom to Brazil, where we explored the weather, the art, the language and many more things!

In our Computing lessons, we have been learning about algorithms and how these can be used not only on the computers but also in real life. We explored this when we wrote our own algorithm for how to make toast and then we even tried making and eating it!

Next term, we are very excited for our new topic "How Do We Grow?" and for our production that will take place in February!









The Shape of the Past

This autumn term, Year 2 have been exploring the question 'How Have Events of the Past Shaped Us?'

We enjoyed learning about The Great Fire of London and we were very lucky to have a visit from both Greater Manchester Fire Service and our firefighter parent! Whilst learning about materials this term, we worked collaboratively to design our own Tudor houses. In Science, we experimented to see how long it takes fire to spread when setting alight a cardboard, wood and brick Tudor house to support us in answering our sub-question 'What Causes a Reaction?'

Later in the term, we enjoyed participating in our Social Responsibility project, where we completed a range of jobs at home in return for donations. We visited our local foodbank to learn more about how it runs and to ask about the items they most





needed; we then purchased these items from our local Tesco. We have also developed our artistic skills and created beautiful pencil drawings of some of London's most famous monuments. More recently, we have learnt how to travel from one place to another, using compass directions, an atlas and a key. This supported us in learning the different continents and oceans of the world in our Geography lessons. We are very much looking forward to our spring term topic and in particular, going on our trip!

Stone Age Story

This term, Year 3 have enjoyed journeying back to the past and learning all about the Stone Age whilst thinking about the question, 'Can Rocks Tell a Story?'

Starting in the Palaeolithic Era, we learned about hunter-gatherers and cave paintings. Continuing with the Mesolithic Era, we explored the change in homes and ways prehistoric humans lived. Entering the Neolithic Era, we discovered the unusual houses of Skara Brae and even had the chance to design and build our own Stone Age shelters. Bringing our learning to life in our Forest School, we continued to develop our skills of building Stone Age shelters. In addition, we learnt how to light a fire and roast a very well-known sugary Stone Age sweet - marshmallows!

Our budding scientists have thoroughly enjoyed gaining knowledge about the different types of rocks and how they are formed. We have even questioned whether rocks can be magic through experimenting with crystals.

Our learning about Mary Anning, the world's greatest fossil hunter, inspired us to explore fossils in more detail. Our creativity has shone brightly when we learned how to print in art using ink and rollers. We produced beautiful fossil prints of ammonites.



Year 4

Changing Technology

This term, Year 4 have been asking the question 'How Has Technology Changed over Time?'

To help us consider this, we studied the **Industrial Revolution** in our History sessions, learning about the significance of Manchester as the first industrial city. This led to a fantastic trip to Quarry Bank Mill at the end of term - the



children represented the school incredibly well, and we were able to share what we had learnt at school as well as extending our knowledge. It was great to see our learning come to life in a genuine cotton mill!

In Science, we investigated electricity, creating our own complete series circuits using wires, bulbs, cells and switches. We then used this knowledge to design, create and evaluate our own Strictly Come Dancinginspired torches, considering a range of design aspects including audience, functionality and innovation. We also used technology to create in other subjects - we learnt weaving skills in our Forest School sessions, and were introduced to the various programmes in Microsoft Office during Computing lessons.

We then rounded our topic off by asking the question 'Is Technology a Good Thing?'
