We were overwhelmed by everyone's donations and we raised over £100 in just one afternoon. 6CK joined forces with RRS to consider what makes a community and to explore some of Gatley's most iconic buildings and landmarks. Working with a local craft group, they produced two incredible 'community chairs' which proudly display some of Gatley's most famous places, including Gatley Primary, Piccolos and the skate park - to name a few.

Year 1

Home and Away

WOW! Year 1 have been so busy this term. They have been so engrossed in our topic, 'Home and Away', travelling around Australia and England and making comparisons between the two.

We learnt about different animal structures and all about the different groups animals belong to. It was so exciting finding out facts about kangaroos! In our art lessons, we created our own Aboriginal art piece – which took lots of patience and concentration, but the finishing products were beautiful!

The children have amazed us this term by working hard to develop their music and drama skills when preparing for the Princess and the Pea performance. After several weeks in school, learning the songs and retelling the story, the children arrived at the Lighthouse Church in Salford, all





dressed up as characters from the story and eager to take part in the interactive vocal performance. Thirty-three classes from across the Greater Manchester Music Hub took part in the day and it was such a special experience for the children.

Later in the term, ICL chose to continue with the animal related ideas, working alongside 4CM, designing and selling our own hanging birdhouses to raise money for Gatley Carrs as part of our whole school project 'Make Your Mark'. We have been astonished with the positive collaboration between the two classes, and they really made us proud as we went on our walks around the Carrs. 1MJ paired up with 5CD and for their project they took some beautiful photographs on their walk around Gatley Village. They have since begun to sell these and raise money for a local cause. It has been such a wonderful experience to watch the project unfold!

Reception



Where Does Our Food Go?

Reception have had an exciting term working on their topic 'Where Does Our Food Go?' We have used maps to find out where we live and investigated the route which the whale took in the story of 'The Snail and the Whale'.

On our journey, we learnt about different foods from around the world and thought about what our favourite foods are. Pasta was a favourite! Through our literacy work, we made bread and recalled the story of 'The Little Red Hen'. We then used our bread to make sandwiches. What happens when we've eaten our food? was a very popular question with Reception and so we became scientists in order to discover the journey of our food through our bodies. We learnt about why we need to digest our food and identified the main organs involved in digestion. We linked our learning of foods and healthy snacks to designing packaging for a healthy snack. We challenged ourselves to create packaging by reusing and recycling other materials, developing our understanding of why recycling is important in protecting our environment.

Class RRCL teamed up with 2EO for our 'Make Your Mark' community project. We worked on an exciting project with a local business 'The Spinn' in Gatley where we were lucky enough to design a healthy meal for their children's menu. Part of our project involved us visiting The Spinn to take part in a workshop looking at, tasting and learning about healthy foods and why healthy foods are



important for our body. We even tried avocado brownies, avocado ice cream and home-made guacamole; who knew you could achieve so much with a simple avocado! The children in both year groups collaborated together throughout our project, including on their exciting menu designs. We very much look forward to seeing the appearance of one of our meal designs on The Spinn menu in the future.





RRS teamed up with 6CK and the lovely ladies from St James' Church craft group to make not one but two Gatley chairs! The children went for a walk around Gatley and took photographs of their favourite place. The children then donated their old clothes to sew their chosen place together within their teams; some even had the chance to work with their Reading Buddies! The children worked so well together as a team to reupholster these beautiful armchairs which enabled us to make two!

RRC teamed up with 4DT to make blankets for Greenbank Veterinary Clinic, with the help of the staff from The Kingsway School and some excellent parent volunteers. The children brought in items that they wanted to recycle in order to make the blankets and also bought some extra bits from the Sue Ryder charity shop in the village. It was wonderful to see such lovely relationships being made between the children and watch them all developing a new skillset... sewing!





Year 2

Man vs World!

Year 2 have had a fantastic, busy term working on their new topic 'Man vs World'. We have learnt about many famous explorers who have travelled far and wide, including Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay (the first people to reach the summit of Mt Everest!).

This linked to our literacy, where we wrote fabulous diary entries in the mind of Hillary and Norgay, using past tense verbs and exciting expanded noun phrases to describe their journey up the highest and most dangerous mountain in the world! We have particularly enjoyed studying famous Asian landmarks and man-made buildings. We used our knowledge to inspire us to create our own buildings in D&T. We challenged ourselves to come up with detailed design plans using recycled materials to make our super structures! They took a long time to make but were definitely worth the hard work and effort!

Class 2EO and RRCL teamed up to 'Make Your Mark' on the Gatley community! We were working on an exciting project whereby we helped a local business, 'The Spinn' to create a healthy meal for their menu. We were very lucky to spend a morning visiting The Spinn; tasting delicious healthy food such as avocado brownies and homemade guacamole! All the children in both classes are very much looking forward to seeing one of their meals make a star appearance on



the children's menu! A big thank you to The Spinn for their generosity and for making our project so much fun!

For our other Make Your Mark project, 2ES collaborated with 5EC to write a song about Gatley. We needed to find out some information about the history of Gatley so met with a local choir group who shared their knowledge and showed us some photographs from many years ago. We then took this information and wrote our own song lyrics. The very talented Mr Butt put our lyrics to a backing track and we were lucky enough to go to Gatley Green and sing our song for the residents.

"Gatley, Gatley, good old Gatley!"



What a busy and scientific term we have had in Year 3. Our topic for this half term was called, 'It's a Hard Rock Life'. We learnt all about different types of rocks such as sedimentary, metamorphic and igneous rock and we conducted so many exciting experiments.

Our favourite was when we used Starburst sweets to represent how different rocks can form together over time. We started by pressing them together lightly to represent sedimentary rock, then added heat and pressure from our hands for metamorphic rock and finally, we melted them in the microwave and observed how they bubbled and mixed to represent igneous rock. We did well not eating them! We loved finding out about rocks changing over time and ended our topic by learning all about volcanoes; learning all about where they are located and the different shapes they can be.

In other subjects, we have been practising our French skills by linking our learning about bodies to their French names. We completed some creative music pieces in groups based on volcanoes and we all learnt a fantastic volcano dance with Miss Kendall.

A big part of this term saw us working with different classes on our 'Make Your Mark' projects. 3SN worked with Nursery to learn about what makes Gatley unique and we thought about how we could thank local businesses for all they do to make Gatley so special. The children worked with the Nursery children to create Gatley inspired art work to go

around flowers that they planted, and then gave them to local shops and businesses as a thank you. They made so many people smile with their gifts and we have seen lots of pictures of the plants popping up on various Facebook pages.

3RR worked with 6JM on an exciting project where they created a local foodbank drop off point. They worked with Year 6 to think about what foodbanks are and why they are so important to local communities. They then created posters on computers to advertise the foodbank drop off point to local people. Not only this, but they also held a cake sale at Elm Road Church to raise money for the local foodbank located at Trinity Church in Cheadle. The cakes quickly sold and they raised over £100! They were so impressed with the wonderful generosity of children and adults in our school and community with their array of kind donations.

We will fondly remember all the exciting things we did and we hope our community work leaves a lasting legacy in Gatley.



Year 4

Lights, Camera, Action

This term we have become 'Super Scientists' as part of our topic 'Lights, Camera, Action'. We all decided that music, sounds and lights were very important in cartoons and films. We asked questions about how sound travels and how light is produced on an animation set like Wallace and Gromit.

Through a variety of fun experiments, we learnt how to change the pitch of a sound using milk bottles full of different amounts of water and a set of rubber band guitars. We also learnt how to show that sound is a vibration using some rice and a drum. Using all the elements of a simple circuit, we learnt how to make the bulb light up and could predict whether or not the circuit was complete.

We also had a fun time in the 'Make your Mark' fortnight.

Mrs Mulligan's class worked with Miss Lowe's class in Year 1. We enjoyed our nature walks to Gatley Carrs and discussed what we could do to help the Carrs with future projects. We thought about raising money by decorating mini birdhouses and asking for donations from our families. We also worked with our Year 1 buddies to produce Gatley Carrs inspired music. We could use our science knowledge to explain how the sounds we were making travelled to our ears! We hope to ask for donations for our birdhouses as soon as we can.



Mr Taylor's class had the opportunity to work with Miss Catton's Reception class. We worked in pairs to create blankets that could be sent to Greenbank Vets, and also to a local hedgehog hospital. We had valuable discussions about the importance of looking after all aspects of our community, and managed to amalgamate these discussions into a fantastic maths and PSHE lesson. The maturity and all round leadership that the children showcased at all times throughout the fortnight was fantastic, and they have made lasting friendships from this.

Year 5

Flashback to the Past

Year 5 had an action packed term and have shown many of their fabulous attributes. Our class trip to Quarry Bank Mill was a wonderful day out and a fabulous way of learning what life was like for children in the Victorian era.
