### Year 1 What came first?

Exploring the question 'What came first?', we discovered how music is created across different historical periods, ordering a range of artists and their known songs in chronological order. Becoming historians, we also learnt about different kings and queens in history, and applied our creativity whilst designing



beautiful portraits of our chosen monarch.

Enjoying the outdoors this term, we participated in sessions with Commando Tim! He supported our learning about Queen Elizabeth II and we applied our problem solving skills

As the school has been

growing, so has our understanding of the building process. We followed the cycle as we designed our very own diorama classrooms, using 'Plan Do Review' to support us with our projects as we worked collaboratively to enhance our learning.



#### Year 2

#### Is there anybody out there?'

## Year 2 have had a wonderful term, exploring the question 'ls there anybody out there?'

We have been busy exploring the whole solar system, from the planets to the sun. We learnt all about the movement of the planets and their relationship to the sun and moons.

We have done a lot of creative work this term; we found out about lots of different artists who have created space artwork, and we created our own pieces in similar styles. We have also explored Holst's musical suite 'The Planets' and this inspired us to think about conducting our own musical piece using a range of instruments.

During our science lessons, we have been finding out about the basic needs of humans and animals. We used this knowledge to work out whether there could be life on Mars.

We have also spent a lot of time outdoors! We have been lucky enough to have the opportunity to be involved in Forest School, have a cricket taster session and worked with Commando Tim to build our teamwork skills.









#### Year 3

#### How powerful is the earth?

We've had a fantastic final term in Year 3 exploring our topic question "How powerful is the earth?"

This topic has allowed us to explore the formation of the earth, from the tectonic plates to the continents of the world. We've been fascinated with the forces that are present all around us such as gravity and we thoroughly enjoyed designing our own science experiment about magnetism!

During this topic, we've also dug deeper by looking at powerful people throughout history. We travelled back to the Roman times and discussed what it was that made the Romans so powerful and how they used this power to conquer Britain. Not only this, but we've harnessed our creative skills this term and created our own Kandinsky inspired artwork, complete with his iconic bright colours and eye-catching patterns.

We've taken the fun outdoors too and took part in a fantastic virtual sports day, complete with bottle flips, 3 minute planks and even a clothes relay! Our Forest School sessions have also developed our team work and problem solving skills, as we worked together to create a wheel-based invention using only natural resources.

We've had a wonderful year and feel ready for Year 4!

## Year 4 Do animals need humans?

What a brilliant final term is has been in Year 4. The dedication and perseverance from the children has been exemplified at every turn, especially when working from home, and their independence has grown from this.

We have had a wonderful final term in Year 4 exploring the question 'Do animals need humans?'

Our topic question has given us the opportunity to develop our geographical knowledge when locating different animals and their habitats around the world. Researching endangered species, we considered both the positive and negative impact of human activity on different habitats and the animals that live there.

Bringing our learning to life at Forest School, we had the opportunity to explore the area around us for different habitats and eco-systems. The children enjoyed the immersive opportunity this presented and embraced the hands-on experience as they identified different insects and animals. Using their creative skills, the children then sketched in great detail what they found and identified how they have adapted to their environment and the food chains they are a part of.



The children have enjoyed taking part on swimming lessons this term and have made fantastic progress developing their overall swimming skills and water safety.

Our virtual sports day presented the children the challenge of completing different challenges that they all enjoyed. The alphabet relay was a definite highlight as the children ran on to the camera with everything from apples to cats to hairdryers!

#### Year 5 Are we the decision makers?

What a brilliant final term we have had in Year 5! As we've explored our philosophical question, we've had plenty of opportunities to consider decision-making in a wide range of curriculum areas.

To think about things that are out of control, we became experts in both natural and manmade disasters, using our research skills to find out about the Chernobyl power plant explosion and the sinking of The Titanic. We used these findings to influence our writing projects in literacy, creating newspaper articles and a balanced argument about whether you should live in a tsunami danger zone. We also made lots of our own decisions, devising our own friction and air-resistance experiments in science, and composing a piece of music only using body sounds, influenced by our listening. Our RE unit led us to ask questions about Buddhists and what their views on decisionmaking are.

We also had fantastic fun learning outside the classroom, including a memorable virtual sports day and sessions with Commando Tim and our sports coach to build upon our physical abilities, as well as a visit to Kingsway for a chicken wire workshop. We are now more than ready for life in Year 6, and can't wait to make the most of our final year at Gatley Primary School!

## Governors Wellbeing

The Governors have been so impressed with the strategies that the school has introduced to support the wellbeing of the children and staff during this challenging year – both through 'home schooling', and as the children have come back into school, and then out again in some cases!



During this last year, we have spoken to the staff, leaders and the children about their experiences – what has worked well and what we can continue to build on as a school.

It's been so lovely to hear that the culture of the school has really supported everyone - where the staff and pupil voice is valued. We have seen how dojo has been a great tool to support communication between the school and families during home schooling, and that the children have valued the supportive videos, direct feedback from teachers, and the ability to take part in collaborative learning with their peers whilst remote learning.

The children have benefited from a focus on activities to support wellbeing this last term. This has built on the success of Wellbeing Wednesday and the Mental Health Ambassadors, and has been an opportunity for the children to do what they wanted to help them get back to enjoying being in school. The Me Time project has been a whole school activity, and boosted the confidence and skills of the children, giving them an opportunity to become 'professors' in various areas of their choosing. Children told us, 'I feel brilliant when I do Me Time' and 'I really want to keep doing Me Time because I look forward to it and it relaxes me a lot'.

It has been wonderful to see the positive impact of the focus on wellbeing, and to hear about the plans to continue this next year as it becomes more embedded across everything the school does.
