Recently, the children have enjoyed learning about Christmas and putting on a wonderful performance for parents and families. The children sang with enthusiasm, and performed their roles extremely well.

Year 2

Reach for the Stars

What an exciting start to Year 2! This term we have explored space in our topic, 'Reach for the stars'. We have learnt so much about the planets and Apollo 11 and even had a visit from Tim Peake!

However, the highlight of this term has to be blasting our own rockets into space from Year 2 Mission Control. The children were so excited to see how high and far their own rockets flew after they designed and made them in teams. The teachers only got a little bit wet!



Year 1

Paddinton Explores

The children have had a fantastic first term in Year 1. They enjoyed learning about Paddington Bear's adventures, and this led them to learn all about London. They then explored the United Kingdom and the countries within it. The children have become excellent geographers and are beginning to use map skills. 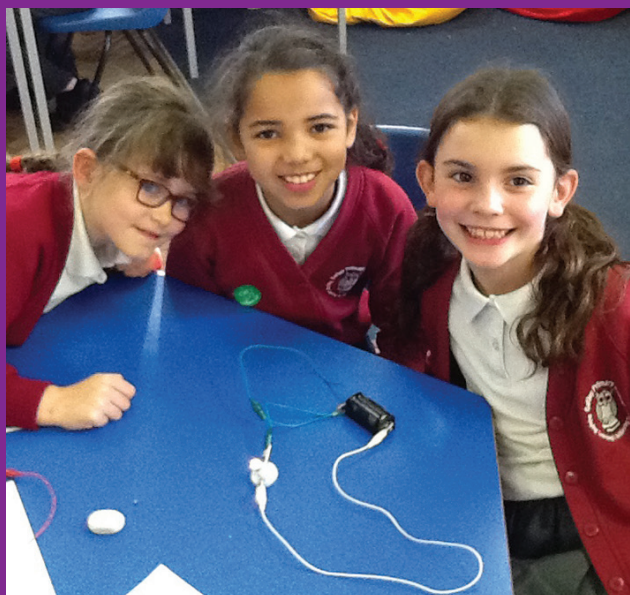
Year 4

Wave and Wires

This term our topic has been 'Waves and Wires!' During our curriculum open morning, Year 4 explored many different sound experiments to see how sounds can be made and changed. The children planned their own sound experiments and wrote a scientific report of their findings! In their assembly, they enjoyed sharing their learning with families as they talked about what they had learnt in science through their investigations.

The story of Peter and the Wolf has inspired the children to learn more about musical instruments and they have compared the different versions of this story (narrative, instrumental and films) in literacy.

Shocking Electricity! - Year 4 have also been learning about the discovery of electricity, and how inventors used electricity to design their inventions. They have been making complete circuits by learning about components, insulators and conductors. Finally, they designed and made their own switches to complete a circuit!



Year 5

Inside the Factory



This term, Year 5 celebrated their topic with a production of "Inside the Factory", where they had the opportunity to dress up as characters throughout the periods of history that they have been studying. The production was a roaring success and the children all enjoyed bringing history to life.

Year 5 also had a fantastic time visiting Quarry Bank Mill, where the children travelled back in time to experience life as a worker in a factory. They're already looking forward to next term's adventures!

PTA

The PTA would like to thank all parents, students and staff for their on-going support towards our fundraising events. It's only by your kind donations to our weekly requests that enable their continued success. You may have read through parentmail that the Christmas fair achieved £2,900 which will go towards learning opportunities and rewards for the children throughout the year. These funds are greatly needed by the school and the PTA hope to have more frequent events for the children during future academic terms.

The PTA is run by parent volunteers some of which have been with us for up to 8 years and some who newly joined just a few months ago. We have children in every year of the school and always welcome new parents who would like

to find out how they can join or simply help out. Although lending your time to help run our school events is very much appreciated, there are other ways in which you can help the school through the PTA; should you have experience that could help with running school discos or cinema nights for the children, or add new stalls to our Christmas or Summer fairs which would help us to achieve more.

Alternatively, an initiative called the Match Funding Scheme enables us to potentially double our fundraising efforts. If you work for an organisation that has a match funding policy, any money raised by your child's school could be matched by your employer. Companies may match the fundraising total for an event, or for the stall that their employee is helping with. Usually, the employee will need to supply a letter

from the PTA, which we can help with.

We understand that high street banks, building societies, supermarkets and large corporations are likely to do match funding, but these schemes are not exclusive to major organisations. If you work for an independent company, they may be interested in charitable giving through match funding too.
