
Our Glenfield Values













Glenfield Values

- Children get a sticker when they show one of the Glenfield Values in class
- •When they get all five... they come to Mrs Clifford to get a special sticker!
- We celebrate the learning attitudes we see!

Traffic lights

- Managing Unwanted Behaviour
- We use a restorative and supportive approach:
- 1. Reminder gentle prompt about expectations
- 2. Reflection time to think and talk about choices
- 3. Repair support to make things right
- 4. Parent Partnership working together when needed
- A traffic light system approach is used as a visual cue for children. See behavior policy for further details.
- If a child gets onto red, then parents would be notified.

Impact...

- Low level behaviour has much improved
- Children can talk about the Rules and Values
- Children are celebrated for showing a super attitude to learning.







Reading at home

Why is reading at home regularly important?

1. Builds Vocabulary and Language Skills

Reading exposes children to new words and sentence structures, helping them develop richer vocabulary and better communication skills.

2. Improves Comprehension and Critical Thinking

Regular reading enhances understanding of ideas, encourages questioning, and develops problem-solving skills.

3. Strengthens Academic Performance

Children who read frequently tend to perform better in subjects like English, science, and even math because reading improves focus and comprehension.

4. Encourages Imagination and Creativity

Books open up new worlds, allowing children to visualize scenarios and think creatively.

5. Develops Concentration and Patience

Reading requires focus and sustained attention, which helps children build these essential skills over time.

6. Fosters Emotional Intelligence

Stories help children understand emotions, empathy, and different perspectives, which are key for social development.

7. Creates Positive Habits

Reading at home establishes a lifelong habit of learning and curiosity, which benefits them throughout life.

8. Strengthens Parent-Child Bond

Deading together can be a comforting routine that promotes also appear and aboved experiences
