Vocabulary

agriculture	When people grow plants and take care of animals to get food, like fruits, vegetables, milk, and eggs.
city	A big place where lots of people live and work. It has many buildings, cars, stores, schools, and parks
countryside	A place with lots of fields, trees, animals, and farms. Not many people live there, and it's not as busy as the city.
farms	A place where people grow food and take care of animals like cows, chickens, and pigs.
foods	What people and animals eat to grow, and stay strong, Can be processed (frozen or fast) or fresh.
factory	A place where things are made or produced (including food)
compass	An instrument that helps you find the directions north, south, east and west.
high street	The main street in a place with shops.

2. What process does food go through to get onto the high street?

Stages of food production

Farmers grow grain, fruit or vegetables. They rear animals.

Washed, cut, changed, cooked or mixed together in a factory.

Packed into a box or bag and delivered.

Bought in shops and markets or delivered.



Some food is processed and goes through 4 stages before we eat it, this is the food's story.

4. What animals are reared in the U.K. for meat and dairy?



Cow are reared for beef and milk, Pigs are reared for pork, Chickens are reared for eggs and chicken.

5. What traditional foods originate from the U.K.?



Different crops grow best when the climate suits them. Foods are considered extra special if they if they come from named places.
