<u>AQA GCSE English Language:</u> <u>Key information</u>

Students will sit two papers for English Language.

<u>Paper 1, Explorations in Creative Reading and Writing</u>, looks at how writers use narrative and descriptive techniques to engage the interest of readers.

P<u>aper 2,</u> *Writers' Viewpoints and Perspectives,* looks at how different writers present a similar topic over time.

- -<u>What</u> do they want you to feel as a reader? * is presented as...
