Component 2: Section A: post-1914 drama/prose and Section B: 19th Century prose

Section A:

Students will be assessed on: One source-based question on An Inspector Calls.

This assessment will test, through a source-based response (students will be provided with an extract from any part in the play), knowledge and understanding of *An Inspector Calls*.

Learners will be expected to comment on the writer's use of language, structure and form and show an understanding of key themes, characters and ideas within the text. This assessment will also test learner's spelling, punctuation and grammar.

This question is worth a total of 40 marks.

Section B:

Students will be assessed on: One source-based question on A Christmas Carol.

This assessment will test, through a source-based response, knowledge and understanding of the 19th century prose novel. Learners will be expected to comment upon the context of the A Christmas Carol, the language, structure and form of the text and key themes, characters and ideas within the text.

This question is worth a total of 40 marks.
