YEAR 7 NATIONAL CUP FINALISTS!

Our Year 7 boys' football team had already made history by reaching the semi-finals of the ESFA Boys under 12s Playstation 9-a-side Schools Cup as no other Warrington school had ever gone as far – but on Monday they went one step further.

The team beat Northampton School for Boys 3-2 in Monday's semi-final, with Jack Waters scoring twice to go with a further goal from Elliot Hardman.

Great Sankey High School will now contest the final at The Hawthorns, the home ground of Championship side West Bromwich Albion - on Monday, May 22.

Having taken a commanding 3-0 lead, the boys caused made onlooking spectators anxious as Northampton scored two late goals. However, the team held out to make it through to the final.

Mr McCann, team manager, said, "Reaching the final is obviously a massive achievement. These boys are ready for the challenge and we aim to give them the best possible

chance to create a lasting legacy. We want to show the country that this is not only a rugby town, but now has school football teams to be recognised nationally."

SCIENCE WEEK

Our Science department recently celebrated a fantastic Science Week with our pupils!

It began with a trip to the Manchester Science and Industry Museum - 60 of our keenest Y7 STEM enthusiasts attended a day of hands-on experiments and exhibitions, including a lively Q&A session with four local STEM professionals. The pupils asked some really insightful questions and learned a lot - they were a credit to our school.

The excitement continued with a speaker from Science Made Simple, delivering the amazing XX Factor show. She spoke to Y7 and Y10 pupils about some of the lesser well-known scientists, engineers and mathematicians who have made great contributions to the world of STEM. The show was informative and entertaining, with smoke rings, a theremin and exploding canisters!

The final event of the week was a fantastic opportunity for a group of our Y9 girls, with the aim of encouraging more girls to consider a career in STEM. We had visitors from United Utilities, who mentored the girls to produce presentations addressing some of the environmental issues faced by such a large water company. The girls engaged really well with the task and included a variety of different media and resources in their presentations, with two teams being awarded prizes for their efforts.





There was a real buzz around the Science department during the whole week - a STEM success!

MATHS CHALLENGE


We would like to proudly celebrate and congratulate all students in Years 9-11 that competed with the best aspiring mathematicians in the country as part of the UKMT Maths Challenge.

Nathan (Y10), Bosco (Y11), Heather (Y11), Alvin (Y11) and Hayln (Y11) all received Gold certificates, meaning they scored in the top 9% nationally. Their impressive results meant they were invited to take part in the Pink Kangaroo Challenge for which they are awaiting their results.

We also had 3 students from Year 10 and 3 from Year 9 receive a Silver Certificate. This means they finished in the top 33% in a field including Year 11s! Another 24 students received Bronze Certificates scoring more than half of all students competing in the UK.

We asked Mrs Cosgrove, Head of Performing Arts, to tell us what is so special about Great Sankey High School shows.

"The school musical is much more than "a play with a few songs". I think people only begin to understand what this experience involves when they come to watch our productions; it is a whole school full scale exhibition, encompassing all of the arts. Those that come to support can see that it really is an equal partnership of acting, a live band, singing, dancing and set design. Those involved also understand the even bigger picture that involves choreography, tech crew, prop crew, costume and make up, marketing, tickets, refreshments and stage management. A lot of work goes into these productions by students, staff and also support from parents. To have the opportunity to be involved in the school musical (in any capacity) teaches our students life skills such as building confidence, commitment, team work, leadership, creativity, expression, independence, perseverance, resilience, emotional intelligence whilst also supporting their social wellbeing. Literary Festival 2023

March saw the return of Great Sankey's annual Literary Festival and this year's involved more events and departments than ever!

The English department arranged for Key Stage 4 students to have two evening trips to see a performance of An Inspector Calls and a trip to Bridgewater Hall for Poetry Live hearing poets such as Carol Ann Duffy, John Agard, Imtiaz Dharker and Simon Armitage perform and discuss their work.

Author visits, arranged by our librarian Ms Clemson, for Year 7 and 8 allowed students to hear from authors Frank Cottrell Boyce and Phil Earle and groups of students had workshops from these successful authors to inspire their own use of the written work.

For the first time, our festival also involved work in other languages thanks to the MFL department with Year 7 watching the Spanish play "Mi personalidad" and Year 8 seeing the French work "La maison hantee."

The Perfoming Arts and Art departments delivered lessons based around works from the English curriculum, with Year 8 and 9 having Drama and Music lessons based around works from Charles Dickens and Year 7 experiencing Art lessons based around the text Eleven. The American author of Eleven, Tom Rogers, joined Year 7 students virtually via Teams to discuss his work and answer their questions.

World Book Day itself saw staff across the school dressing up as literary characters for Key Stage 3 students to participate in a challenge to name each character and there were literary events in the LRC. Thank you to all staff who took part. Mr Brighouse

School Uniform—A Reminder

As we reach the end of term, we would like to take the opportunity to revisit the uniform expectations so that students are prepared for the return after Easter. Uniform is an important part of a school's identity. It reinforces who we are as a community and helps allow students to feel pride in their school. It also helps prepare students for life after school where many will have to dress smartly for work. The uniform policy is available on the website for further reference, but please see the additional guidance below:

Socks - black ankle socks.

Shoes – black polishable leather or simulated leather. No boots, canvas shoes or trainer style shoes are permitted, including branded sports makes including (but not limited to) Nike, Adidas, Reebok, Converse, Stan Smiths and Vans. We are aware that companies do market these as school shoes but they must meet our criteria.

Coat – due to the change in weather we will not be allowing coats in the school building. Hoodies and non-school jumpers remain prohibited.

Make-up, false eyelashes, nail varnish or jewellery – must not be worn for school. Items of jewellery which are not in line with the policy will be confiscated and students can collect at the end of the day from their year office for first offences.

We will be enforcing the uniform policy when we return after Easter. On the first day back staff will check the uniform of all students in form time and throughout the day. This will continue each day of the first week, for those who turn up in incorrect uniform. We will contact you each day when the uniform is not correct.

If you have any questions about the guidance, please do not hesitate to contact your child's year team or refer to the uniform policy on the website. If you are unsure whether a piece of uniform is acceptable, please consult the school before buying.
