<p><b>Useful revision resources:</b> List websites, links to past papers, books etc here Your first point of revision should be your class books and work books from the beginning of year 12. You can also access the student hand books that have been distributed and the revision lists form your class teacher.</p> <p>You should focus your revision on the key themes of change and continuity, significance and cause and consequence.</p> <p>Past papers are available on the AQA website.</p>	
<p><b><u>Which revision guides etc do you recommend, how can students buy these?</u></b></p> <p>There are a wide range of revisions guides available but the best are your work books as they have been designed to prevent cognitive overload and help you develop knowledge of the time.</p> <p>Textbooks are available to rent from the department for a returnable deposit of £10 per book.</p>	
<p><b>Revision Tips</b></p> <p>The first step should be to identify gaps in your knowledge. Use the title blue sheets and knowledge organisers to RAG your confidence.</p> <p>Use the structured revision that you have completed to ‘crunch’ your notes in to smaller manageable pieces.</p>
