- Daily Whole Class Reading/ Phonics/RWI Comprehension lessons.
- Home reader- Children take home a book from the library.
- Extra reading at home- Bug Club/Boost





How are our reading lessons structured?

Whole Class Reading: Achievement for All, Accessible and Made for All Children.


Day 1- Introduction to a new text.

Day 2- Retrieval

Day 3- Inference

Day 4 - Sequence/Summarise

Children read during **every session** either to the whole class, to a peer or to a teacher.





Day 1- Text Introduction/ Vocabulary

- Introduce the new text to the children.
- Predictions are made
- Focus is on reading fluencyexpression, pace, and volume.
- Introduce key vocabulary.

Predict: What do you think this book is going to be about? Write your thoughts down on a post it note. I think that this book is about... I think this because... Illustrated by Mauro Evangelista



Day 2- Retrieval

- Understanding of the text.
- Being able to retrieve and recall information from the text.
- Answer questions based on the text.
- Answer using sentence stems to ensure good use of English and written skills.

KS2 Reading Vipers

Retrieve

Retrieve and record information and identify key details from fiction and non-fiction.

Example questions

- How would you describe this story/text? What genre is it? How do you know?
- · How did ...?
- How often...?
- Who had...? Who is...? Who did....?
- · What happened to ...?
- What does.... do?
- How is?
- · What can you learn from from this section?
- · Give one example of.....
- · The story is told from whose perspective?



Day 3- Inference

- Using clues from the text to answer questions.
- These answers cannot be taken directly from the text.
- This is a deeper level of thinking as children must comprehend the text in order to be able to do this well.

KS2 Reading Vipers

Infer

Make and justify inferences using evidence from the text.

Example questions

- · Find and copy a group of words which show that...
- How do these words make the reader feel? How does this paragraph suggest this?
- How do the descriptions of show that they are
- · How can you tell that......
- What impression of do you get from these paragraphs?
- · What voice might these characters use?
- · What was thinking when.....
- · Who is telling the story?





Day 4- Sequence

- Sequencing events in chronological order.
- Summarising events that occur in the text.
- Children should be aware of what is happening in the text, what has happened in the text and what they think will happen next.


KS1 Reading Vipers

Sequence

Sequence the key events in the story.

Example questions

- Can you number these events 1-5 in the order that they happened?
- What happened after?
- What was the first thing that happened in the story?
- Can you summarise in a sentence the opening/middle/end of the story?
- In what order do these chapter headings come in the story?





Phonics – Mrs Suffield and Mrs Muhammad

 To meet the needs of all pupils, some children are following our Read, Write Inc phonics programme.

Structure of lesson:

- Speedy sound- learn new sound, read words with the new sound, review sounds taught and spell words with the new sound.
- Story reading
- Get Writing- grammar, sentence building, vocabulary and creative writing.


How can you help?
